IMBLER WOMAN DOES BIG WORK FOR RED CROSS

IMBLER, Ore., April 19.—(Special)—As the war has ended and every one has had the honor of doing their part in the noble work, we wish to let the people know of the faithful service performed by Mrs. J. C. Blanchard, of Imbler. She has, during the period of the war, knit 52 sweaters, 49 pairs of socks, made 52 suits of pajamas, 13 bed shirts, 5 bath robes, 3 suits of boy clothes and knit 2 pairs of mittens and 3 pairs of wristlets, meaning a total of 181 articles and 2395 actual hours of work. "Grandma" Blanchard, as she is familiarly known, has never missed one day of the Red Cross work in two years. This is very remarkable as she is 72 years of age. She has one son, C. E. Blanchard in the service. He has been in for over a year, and is with the 12th Regiment of Marines, located at St. Nazaire, in France. He is wearing one gold stripe for six months actual overseas service for Uncle Sam.

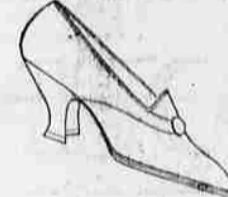
