MILLIONS IN KOREA WANT INDEPENDENCE

Secret Organizations Have Been Fostering Movement for Long Period.

PEKING. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Several secret societies whose numbers aggregate millions of persons are supporting the independence movement in Korea. It is understood. Notable among them are the Progressive party and the Heaven Worshipers which together have a membership of more than 2,000,000 persons. Others are the New Korean Society and the Light Restoring Society. Sixty thousand students of nearly all educational institutions, including governmental schools, participated in the movement. It is stated that the insurrection was supported also by Christian and Buddhist monks.

The Buddhists in Korea number about one million. They have 2,000 temples and 100,000 priests. The Japanese have attempted to use Buddhism to strengthen their position of Korea, sending many young priests to Japan to be educated. Nevertheless, many Buddhists are believed to have been closely connected with the insurrection.

Christianity has made rapid progress in Korea for thirty years. Two large missionary bodies are working there. The American Methodist Mission has 759 churches and 100,000 followers, while the American Presbyterian Mission has 2,000 churches and about 200,000 adherents. The Korean Christians are mostly men of character and have received higher education.

The demonstration in favor of independence which began in nearly all towns and villages throughout Korea on March 1, was at first orderly and limited to the delivery of speeches and distribution of copies of manifestos. Later the movement took a distinctly revolutionary character and this resulted in clashes with the Japanese authorities and in the casualties on both sides.

BALZAC HOME IN PARIS REOPENED

Hundred Per Cent Clubs

PARIS. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The home of the famous French author Honore de Balzac in the Rue Raynouard at Passy was reopened today as an artists' center. The house which is surrounded by an old world garden had been sadly neglected, but has now been restored to present the appearance it had in Balzac's time, with its vestibule painted blue and the original oak carvings and dark red tapestries decorating the apartment where Balzac wrote his masterpiece.

On the table stands the big china coffee-pot from which the author was wont to refresh himself, for Balzac was a mighty drinker of coffee. Old woodcuts and original printing proofs adorn the walls. In the garden the vine that Balzac tended still grows and his beloved lilacs have been replanted there.

In one room there is still the trap-door through which Balzac used to disappear when important creditors called.

L. O. S. CHURCH BUYING BONDS

TOTAL SUBSCRIPTIONS REACH SUM OF \$250,000

Purchases for the Victory Loan Are Credited to Three Women's Organizations of the Church

"Salt Lake's campaign for the Victory Liberty loan has opened up with tremendous impetus and every indication points to a success that will make the city proud of itself," declared City Manager Lester D. Freed yesterday, in the Salt Lake Tribune.

Two important factors stood out strikingly as features of Friday's work by the committees of men who are canvassing business houses and the women who are taking care of the downtown booths and the bungalow bank at Second South and Main streets.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints announced its subscription of \$250,000 for the Victory loan and a short time later the Z. C. M. announced a subscription of \$100,000. Then during the afternoon of Friday came an announcement from the Utah-Idaho Sugar company that it had subscribed for \$250,000, and this was followed by C. W. Nibley's personal subscription of \$25,000.

In announcing the subscription of the Mormon church of \$250,000, President Grant stated that the three auxiliary women's organizations of the church—the Relief society, the Young Ladies' Mutual Improvement associations of the church and the Primary association. President Grant stated that the women of the church had worked so hard for the success of various war drives that he felt credit for the big Victory subscription of the church was no more than was due them.

Women's organizations of the Mormon church met at Magna last night and made plans for their campaign.

The subscription of the Inland Crystal Salt company of \$20,000 was announced late Friday afternoon.

The quarter-million investment in the fifth Liberty loan announced by the Mormon church yesterday brings the total amount of bonds purchased by that organization in this and previous Liberty loans to \$1,250,000.

City Campaign Manager Freed is making a strenuous appeal to all companies and firms in the city, asking that employees' 100 per cent clubs be formed in every business organization, and as soon as the employees have subscribed for the Victory Liberty loan 100 per cent strong that their names be sent to him.

"We want every industrial concern in the city to organize employees into 100 per cent clubs immediately," said Mr. Freed.

"This is one of the most important phases of Salt Lake's campaign and we are anxious to have this end of the work taken care of immediately."

State News

Hells is the first town in Unadilla county to go over the top. The quota for Hells was \$29,375.

The state convention of the Oregon Sunday School Association is to be held in Baker during the dates May 20-22, according to the announcement of Harold F. Humbert, of Portland, J. S. Gilbertson is chairman of the local committee on arrangements and A. R. Bagley chairman of the publicity committee.

In an application filed with the public service commission for a right to increase rates, the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company asserts that the daylight saving law inaugurated by that government has had a detrimental effect upon its business and has decreased its gross revenue from 6 to 8 per cent.

Bryant B. Ryall of Gladstone, Or., and Malcolm W. Arnold of London, O. Young Men's Christian association workers, recently captured by the bolsheviks—are "safe and well treated," according to a telegram received by the Y. M. C. A. war work council from Acting Secretary of States Park, quoting advices from Archangel.

Baker teachers will next year receive a general monthly salary raise of about \$10, according to a decision reached by members of the school board of District No. 3 at Baker. According to W. S. Bowers, clerk of the board, the local wage schedule will be higher than any town in the state with the exception of Portland, Idaho and Washington towns have higher salaries because of the fact that they have large school funds derived from school lands.

STORM OF WHITE DUST

SALT LAKE CITY, April 21.—Towns in the vicinity of Great Salt Lake were visited by one of their infrequent "freak" storms recently, a white dust, said by some to be salt, falling over the entire Salt Lake Valley in conjunction with a light rainfall. Some of the older inhabitants call them "salt-storms" and maintain that so is rained upon the earth.

According to the local weather bureau, however, the fall of salt or sand, comes only when there is a high wind which whips the salt or sand from the salt beds in the vicinity of Salt Lake and drops it several miles away. It is said that most of the substance which gives everything a white coat is sand and not salt, but this is disputed by those who have tasted the substance and pronounced it salt.

Neither man has the slightest advantage over the other, so far as physical measurements go and as to the ability of these two high class athletes, no man can tell until they have finished their argument on the mat. Each has a great following locally and both are among the best known wrestlers on the Pacific coast.

Walter Miller, world's champion middleweight, has posted \$1000 with a Portland sportsman for a match with Thye, and Promoter Anderson announces that he is going to make a strong bid to bring the contest to La Grande. That is to say, Anderson says he is prepared to spend the limit to bring the great middleweight here to meet the winner of Tuesday night's finish match.

Tickets are selling fast for the bout and everything indicates probably the largest house ever in attendance at a similar event in this city. Both men appear to be in good condition and each is more than eager to be returned winner. Dr. Zimmerman will act as referee, while Jack Pearce, veteran sporting official will keep time.
