# SPLENDID TALKS BY PROF. DAVIS

WHITMAN COLLEGE PROFESSOR HERE YESTERDAY

Conducted Easter Services in Presbyterian Church—Evening Address on Lloyd George.

La Grande Presbyterians felt themselves extremely favored yesterday to have with them for both their morning and evening services Prof. W. R. Davis, head of the English department of Whitman College, Walla Walla. The morning service was more largely attended than was the evening one, and Dr. Davis gave a beautiful and appropriate sermon for Easter morn. Special music was furnished by the choir, Mrs. A. L. Richardson singing "With Verdure Glad," from "The Creation, and the choir rendering a special anthem. Dr. Davis' address in the evening was especially fine and particularly appreciated. The subject of his theme was the life and works of David Lloyd George, Britain's great premier. He told impressively the story of the rise of the young Welshman, who was left an orphan and raised by his cobbler-procter uncle; of how, not having the means to go to college, he was educated by the same uncle and was admitted to the practice of law at twenty-one years of age. He told how he gained national fame at twenty-five years of age through successful opposition of established rules of the Church of England and how he was elected to the English parliament over the man who had formerly been his landlord. When war came upon England in 1914 Lloyd George was the man to whom England turned for leadership—the man who was the apostle of democracy, and no, to one of the many peers of the English realm, fine men and capable though many of them were. It was this man, he reminded his hearers, who established England's financial arrangements for the war so firmly that they have stood the terrible strain without cracking, and who settled the labor troubles in England and gave to the soldiers in France the bullets and guns they needed so badly. This is the man, who, championing the cause of democracy in England, has had in his hands more power than any English king who ever sat on the throne. And now Lloyd George is in Paris, working for a peace that will be founded on the same just principles for which Britain and America fought in this last war, the three cardinal points of the sanctity of treaties, the rights of small nations for self-government, and the diminishing of armaments. When we were in the war, he said, we declared we were fighting against organized military machines, to bring to pass a time when no nation would dare to keep up such an army as Germany had; and now the men who hold the highest ideals for the future of this nation and for the future of the world are striving for the attainment of a lasting peace founded on the same principles.

# MEXICA FOR SALOON MEN

EL PASO, Texas, April 21.—Juarez, the Mexican metropolis of border towns, has become the oasis in the great American prohibition desert.

On Calle Comercio, the number of saloons has increased since the operation of the Texas military zone law until every other door opens into a barroom. Barrels of American-made whiskey and wine are offered to persons permitted to cross the border under prevailing passport regulations.

Many of the old time El Paso saloon keepers who were familiar figures at famous and notorious places here have donned white aprons in Juarez. Bars and fixtures from El Paso have been set up in Juarez, slot machines have been installed and, except for the preponderance of Mexican idlers, a visitor would think he is in an El Paso bar of former years.

Bootlegging, the head maiden of the border saloon, is becoming an important industry. American authorities have discovered that Mexican servants, wash women and street laborers who cross to El Paso each morning carry contraband liquor in quantities and are making far more money through its disposal than they are from their labors.

The prosperous Mexican saloon keepers say that a return to normal passport regulations will make Juarez the mecca of sporting men from the United States.

# A LOGANBERRY PRODUCER

G. L. Golay, of Cove, Apparently Holds the Record on This Line

As far as is now known G. L. Golay, of Cove, holds the record of his locality as well as of the entire county in the production of loganberries. As a matter of fact the production of this species of fruit has not yet reached an extensive scale in this part of Oregon. Mr. Golay is the leader in the venture and has a total of about one acre in loganberries. Last year his output was about 225 crates, but this was because his bushes have only fairly commenced bearing. His plantings are but about three years of age. This season he expects a crop of three or four times that of last year.

Mr. Golay's place is near that of the celebrated Geo. Thomas cherry orchard which has about thirty acres of cherry trees. It is also near the Stackland Bros' fruit farm.
