INTRASTATE RATE CASE DECISION TO BE EXPEDITED

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Upon the government's motion, concurred in by North Dakota authorities, the supreme court Monday agreed to expedite consideration of appeals brought by the railroad administration from the state supreme court's decrees enjoining the Northern Pacific railroad from increasing intrastate freight rates and passenger rates, subject to an order of Director General Hines and fixed May 5 for hearing arguments.

UNMATH'S SCHOOLS IN LEAD IN COUNTY

In school matters the town of Unmath again takes the lead in Unmath county. Contracts received from teachers there this morning by County Superintendent Green show that Unmath teachers are contracted for ten months of school next year.

The minimum salary of \$180 is also an advance in school affairs for this county. The new contracts run from \$180 to \$105 for the grade schools and \$1500 a year for the superintendent.
