KANSAS WHEAT CROP REPORT ENCOURAGING

Condition and Average Shows Better Than in History of Any State This Time of Year.

TOPEKA, Kan., April 21.—The first Kansas wheat crop report of the year, issued Friday by the secretary of the state board of agriculture, shows that the condition and average of wheat in Kansas this year is the best and largest in the history of any state at this time of year.

The report places the average at 10,758,000 acres and the condition is estimated at 99.32.

If the ordinary method of figuring the yield is used, the forecast is that the state will produce more than 215,000,000 bushels of wheat from this crop.

Under guaranteed prices the value of the crop would be \$475,000,000, or nearly a half billion dollars. This would average about \$45 per capita for the entire state.

A SPEEDY AIRPLANE

PARIS, April 21.—France's fastest airplane today is the new Nieuport biplane No. 22, which was completed in the late fall of 1918, and was to have been incorporated as a fighting unit in the French air forces this month. This biplane carries a 200 horse power engine, and with a load of 340 pounds, reached at the official tests a speed of 147 1/2 miles an hour. It climbed 1,000 meters in 11 1/2 seconds, 2,000 meters in 29 1/2 seconds and 5,000 meters in 1 1/2 minutes. At the latter elevation a speed of 131 miles an hour was maintained.

Some motion picture people seem to think, Alaskans say, that Gero is truth in the line. "There's nary a law of God, or man north of fifty-three." Residents of this northern do not want motion picture patrons of the outside world to get the idea that here are always "stampedes over the frozen trail" in Alaska, that Alaskans are snow covered, all the time, that good houses and gambling halls run wide open and that gambler's hall of nuggets and fair maidens can be had "for the grabbing."

Recently it was reported here a motion picture company intended to send an outfit north to take some real Alaskan moving pictures.
