**AD CLUB THRILLED BY SPEECH TODAY**

President Coolidge very skillfully expressed the great pleasure the Ad Club members felt in having Captain Kelley lunch with them.

**Attention for Soldiers**

Chas. H. Reynolds, U. S. employment agent, spoke briefly in behalf of the men who are returning from overseas and asked the Ad Club members to do all in their power to assist these boys in returning to civil life and securing suitable occupations. Many of these are college men, he said, and they should not be expected to be satisfied with pick and shovel or teamster jobs. That the business men of the city watch out for any possible opening for the soldiers was the appeal he made.

E. E. Kiddle, county campaign manager for the Victory Loan, made a statement of the facts in regard to the claims made by Union county for the honor of being the first county in the state to subscribe its quota. The honor has been awarded Washington county, he said, their claim being based on the fact that at the convention March 25th the county chairman made the statement that he would guarantee then that his county would go over the top. Whether or not that meant that their quota was subscribed then, he had been informed by State Director Eldridge that Union was the first actually to do the work, and he offered the consolation that while Washington county has the name, Union has the fame of the achievement.

**Larison on Good Roads Again**

G. L. Larison was primed as usual for a good road talk, but contended himself with stating that the plan that has been outlined by the Union county committee was commended upon by the state highway commissioners as the most reasonable and the most complete one any county has yet prepared. It will cost two and three-quarter million dollars, to do the road work planned, he said, but the highway commission have guaranteed their support if Union county does its part. The county's part, he said, is to see that the one mill market roads bill and particularly the six per cent. tax limitation bill receive a favorable vote in June.
