Mrs. Schilke states that she will be unable to attend the conference, anxious though she is to do so, and she has written Governor Olcott asking that another delegate be appointed from Oregon, in order that the state may not be unrepresented.

TRACK MEET FOR GRADE SCHOOLS

CENTRAL, RIVERIA AND GREENWOOD WILL COMPETE

Classes Have Been Organized By Physical Director of "Y" for Events May the Tenth

Saturday, May 10, will be the biggest day of the year for some of the grammar school kids, for on that day the boys from the Central, Riviera and Greenwood schools will clash in a triangular track meet at the Central school grounds. All boys will have a chance to show their prowess in the speed events and in the field contests.

The three schools were organized last week by the physical director of the Y. M. C. A. and the boys are out each night getting their teams into shape.

The captains of the respective schools are as follows:

Greenwood, school, Collier; Riviera school, Lynch; Central school, Smith.

The boys will be divided into three classes, according to weights. The smaller boys will compete against boys under 50 pounds. The other two classes are from 50 to 115 pounds and above 115 pounds. Each of these classes will have the same races and events, except those under 50 pounds, who will not run the half mile.

The list of events is as follows: 50 yard dash, 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 440 yard dash (1/2 mile), 880 yard run (1/4 mile), Running broad jump, Running high jump, Standing broad jump, Pole Vault, Shot putt, Relay race, with four boys from each school competing.
