There has been considerable disappointment recently over the price to be paid for shearings this year, the most disappointing upon 17-18 cents a lb., while the growers are offering five cents a lb. less. Shearings in some sections of Utah and southern Idaho already is under way.

STOLE RED CROSS SUPPLIES

Australian Soldiers in Prison Camps Did Not Receive Packages Sent to Them

SYDNEY, Australia. (Correspondent of Associated Press)—Charges that Germans who handled Red Cross parcels for Australian soldiers in German camps robbed the prisoners of their Red Cross parcels are made by Captain Alexander Donaldson of the steamship Matunga. He was captured when the Matunga was taken by the German steamer Wolf and was sent to a prison camp in the Harz mountains.

"The officer in charge of the camp was an old rogue," said Captain Donaldson. "He seemed to make a business of robbing us of our Red Cross parcels. About 40 per cent of them went astray before the armistice and about 50 per cent after it, owing to disorganization in Germany. The 'Fritz' who had the job of driving from the station to the camp with our parcels had a habit of dropping a lot of them off at his shop on the way up."

HAWAIIANS PLAN MEMORIAL

HONOLULU, T. H. March 24.—(By Mail)—Plans of the Hawaiian war memorial committee to perpetuate the memory of the men from Hawaii who died in the world war, may take the form of a memorial park in the beach at Waikiki, together with an arch or other appropriate monument.

It is proposed to acquire the beach property of the William G. Irwin estate, with an ocean frontage of 1200 feet, and lying between the sea of Kapiolani park, and to there make a territorial playground and bathing resort, dedicated to those now sleeping in Flanders fields. It is believed that property can be purchased for about \$200,000.

Negotiations will be opened with Mrs. Irwin and her daughter, M. Templeton Crocker of San Francisco.
