SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS TO HOLD A CONVENTION

SPokane, Wash., April 25.—Delegates representing 1,000 Sunday schools in thirty counties of eastern Washington and northern Idaho will gather here May 6, 7 and 8 to attend the annual Inland Empire Sunday School association's convention. Although attendance is limited, it is expected that 2,000 persons will be present at the meeting. More than 10,000 teachers and officers are engaged in the schools represented, it was stated today, and over 100,000 pupils attend them. The association includes all Protestant Sunday schools of the district.

Besides the general sessions, at which prominent churchmen and Sunday school workers will speak, seven simultaneous meetings for Sunday school workers will be held during the three days of the convention, and two presents will be given by the Spokane Junior choir, an organization of over 100 Sunday school pupils.

Church consolidation will come up for discussion during the session, when speakers from towns of the district where churches have been federated will discuss "To What Extent Has Church Federation Been a Success?" The biennial budget for the Sunday school association, which maintains offices here with a staff of paid workers, will be settled, and officers elected for the next two years.

Teacher training sessions will be in charge of A. M. Lockie of Chicago, organization expert for the national Sunday school association, and among the other forty speakers scheduled to appear are Bishop Frank E. Koster of the Tacoma Episcopal diocese; Dr. Mark A. Matthews, pastor of the First Presbyterian church at Seattle; Dr. Joshua Stansfield, pastor of the First Methodist church at Portland, Ore.; James E. Evans of Portland, superintendent of what is declared to be the largest Sunday school in the Pacific northwest; Hilton Herman Pace of the Spokane diocese of the Episcopal church; Mayor Ole Hanson of Seattle also has been invited to speak.

State News

The Oregon Single Tax League is preparing to initiate a single tax amendment to the state constitution.

One of the largest distributing stations for oil and gasoline is being installed at Astoria. It consists of 10 concrete tanks with a capacity of 2,000,000 gallons.

Barns was unanimously chosen by the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association in the final session of their annual convention at Bend Wednesday as the next convention city.

William M. Hannum, Josephine county pioneer of 1851, and a Civil war veteran, is dead at his home at Murray, on the Applegate. He was a lieutenant in the Humboldt and Bald Hill Indian wars.

A contract was awarded Wednesday by the Valley Packing company for the construction of a big meal packing plant in North Salem. The contract was let to F. J. Leonard of Portland, and work is to commence Monday. The entire plant, when completed, including buildings, machinery, stockyards and equipments, is to cost more than \$1,500,000.

After murdering his wife, Mrs. Susie Reighan Hardwick Sar, aged 41, and her son, David Hardwick, aged 16, as they soundly slept in their beds in their homestead abode five miles from Madras Wednesday night, Charles Sar, a rancher, aged 33, placed the 22 rifle between his feet, pulled the trigger with one foot and died instantly, shot through the temple.

NEW HOLIDAY IN MONTANA

MISOULA, Mont., April 25.—Women students of the University of Montana here took their places with rakes this spring at the annual observance of "Arbor" day, and assisted the young men students in raking the campus. "Arbor" day is a modification of "Arbor" day at the university, in honor of Professor William Arber, a member of the original university faculty and an enthusiast for beautifying the campus.

"Blacks" from both the faculty and students who failed to report for duty in the annual spring campus-cleaning were taken in custody by "collection" men from men and women students and faculty members, and were forced to wear blackened noses for the remainder of the day. Women students served lunch and the university band, heartened the workers with music during the day and played for a dance on the campus at noon.

23,887 AMERICANS KILLED IN ACTION

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Revised casualty totals announced Wednesday by the war department placed the total of dead in the army and marine corps at 75,544 of which 23,887 were killed in action. Prisoners reported were 4791, including 15 reported now held by the Bolsheviks. Of prisoners previously held by the central powers the records now show 28 died during internment and 118 of doubtful status.

The grand total of wounded in the list is 281,230, of whom it has been estimated more than 85 per cent returned to duty.
