WHO WAS EDITH CAVELL?

Edith Cavell, who lived with her mother in the little town of Norfolk, England, was being courted by a young neighbor, George Brooks. They were both very much in love with each other, but when it came time for the proposal, Edith declined. She intended to devote her life to nursing and the care of the sick and miserable.

A few years later Edith Cavell became a recognized authority in the field of nursing. She was director of three Belgian hospitals and instructor at a Belgian School for Certified Nurses. During one of her trips back to England she again meets the sweetheart of her girlhood days, George Brooks, who has become a lieutenant in the English army. During an uprising in Africa, Brooks has been blinded and his wife killed. He has come back to his home town with his only son, Frank, to attend to the preparation for the restoration of his eyesight. Edith decides to remain until after the operation.

On August 4, 1914 Lieutenant Brooks regains his eyesight. The same day word is received that Germany has declared war on France and has begun its invasion of Belgium and that England has already begun to mobilize.

Brooks' son, Frank, answers the first call to England's sons and sails. Edith Cavell goes back to her post of duty in the Brussels hospital.

After the fall of Louvain and Liege, the Hunns are about to enter Brussels, when word is brought to Nurse Cavell. She refuses to leave her post. She has received a letter from her old friend, Lieutenant Brooks, telling her that his son has been reported as missing and asking her to do her best to locate him. During her daily trips to the cellars of the hospital where the wounded soldiers of the Allied nations have been placed, she comes upon Frank Brooks. She helps him escape to the Holland border. She is discovered and imprisoned. She confesses that she has helped many English boys to escape. Upon this confession she is taken before the German Military Court and sentenced to die. At 2 o'clock in the morning of October 12, 1915, this martyr to humanity was marched to the prison yard and shot.

NEW AGRICULTURAL COURSE

PULLMAN, Wash., April 25.—Wool grading, sheep shearing and industry in Washington and the Pacific Northwest generally, will be given a prominent place in collegiate and short-course teaching schedules of the college of agriculture here, in the terms beginning next September, according to Dean Edward C. Johnson, whose recommendations have been approved by President E. O. Holland.

The plan looks to the holding of short courses in the Yakima valley and other sheep-producing parts of the state, on sheep farms. Practical demonstration in sheep shearing, in wool grading and in other essential operations of the industry will be given.
