The two are said to be Spanish syndicalists and are charged with implication in plots against the government at New York and Philadelphia.

**ARMENIANS WANT TO PROTECT COUNTRYMEN**

WASHINGTON, April 25.—Formal request was made of the state department Thursday by the Armenian national delegation that the Armenians in this country be permitted to raise and equip a force of 10,000 Armenians among those already trained in the United States army, for service in Asia Minor in protecting non-Moslem peoples from further massacres by the Turks. The request was presented to Assistant Secretary Phillips by Miran Sevasly, chairman of the Armenian National Union of America.
