shall not have flame. The Italian premier received an ovation, with the phrase "Italy-Finland-Dalmatia" displayed prominently.

Baron Sonnino has left Paris for Rome to join the premier. The minor members of the Italian delegation remained in Paris.

There has been little change in the situation in Paris. Attention there is focused on Rome and what developments may occur there. The British and American delegations are hopeful of a satisfactory adjustment, but are fearful that the enthusiasm of the Italian people may compel the Italian delegates to make demands which cannot be met.

President Wilson conferred with all the members of the American delegation late this afternoon. This afternoon he met with Premier Lloyd George and Clemenceau to discuss the financial clauses of the peace treaty.

A statement issued in Paris saying that the report was inaccurate that the British and French premiers had not approved President Wilson's statement on the Adriatic problem added that the premiers had sent a joint statement of their views to Premier Sonnino.

It was said that the creation of a British-Belgian public opinion in the British Islands is desirable. Meanwhile various committees of the peace conference are preparing for the plenary session Monday to consider the League of Nations covenant and the presentation of the peace treaty to the German delegates at the middle of the week.

LITTLE DIFFERENCE IN BOYS

Gaily Idea That Those Born in May Are Naturally More Cruel Than Other Youngsters.

What is the origin of the belief that boys born in the month of May are cruel to nature? In a column of the Boston Herald, one of our favorite newspapers, we read the following: "I was born in May, and as I look back into the days of my infancy I am often surprised to recall many acts of cruelty perpetrated by me and my companions, on birds and animals.
