METHODISTS FORFEITED GAME

A. when the Methodist team forfeited the game to the M. I. A. after both teams were on the floor ready to play. A few weeks ago when the Methodists played the Baptists the latter could not have played had it not been that they secured two men from the second M. I. A. team and one other player. At the out set of this game Chas. H. Reynolds, who refereed, ruled that the game, because of it not being played by Methodists, should be forfeited to the Baptists. The Methodists did not understand that such was the decision and came Thursday night prepared to play the M. I. A. aggregation. When it was learned that the game they played with the Baptists was forfeited they would not play, since there was no hope of winning the cup.

The Baptists were defeated by the Presbyterian team by a score of 29 to 43. The game was hard fought throughout the entire thirty minutes. Proctor, Kivette and Hesse were on their toes all through the game and played well. For the Baptists, Kenney, Thelton and L. Chandler were very much in evidence. M. Chandler played well as did Ted Heldenreich.

Since the M. I. A. have the cup secured there will be no more games of the church league. It was thought that the season would continue until May 7, but because of the blow up last night it was deemed wise to discontinue the games.

WRESTLING MATCH

A worthy opponent for Ad Santel for the Ad club show to be held at the Arcade May 10th, was decided upon yesterday by C. D. Emahiser at Boise, after witnessing the Santel-De Court match at the Pinney theatre the night before.

Mr. Emahiser says: "It has been my good fortune to see some of the best matches ever staged in America, among them the Gutch-Hackenschmidt world's championship contest at Dexter pavilion in Chicago a few years ago, and many other big matches in various parts of the country, but the match between Santel and De Court was the fastest, most fiercely contested bout I have ever witnessed and was considered by the big crowd present and the Boise papers as a premier classic, as you will note from the following clipping from the Boise Capital News:

"Santel, the mighty, the noblest Roman of them all in the light-heavyweight class, won from Nick De Court Thursday night in one hour and forty-five and a half minutes by taking two out of three falls. Only a little less mighty was De Court, who tried to form, took the first fall from Ad in twenty-eight minutes, when the champion was forced to concede a fall through the toe hold route. The victory gives Santel the Pacific coast heavyweight championship.

About Roller Skates.

Roller skates were patented and used in France as early as 1819. A few years later an Englishman named James patented them and manufactured them in London. Several other similar skates were patented in England during the next 30 years.
