JAMES K. LYNCH DIES SUDDENLY IN CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—James K. Lynch, governor of the United States, died early Monday at his home in Alameda, near here, from an attack of heart disease.
Mr. Lynch was a son of James Lynch, pioneer of California of 1846, and started his banking career with the First National bank here in 1877 as a teller. He advanced to the position of vice president of the institution and later became director of the twelfth federal reserve bank, representing the bankers of this district.
The success in reaching quotas in the Fourth Liberty loan campaign in the western district was due largely to his energy and activity.
His death in action in the Arzonne battle of his son, Lieutenant Lawrence S. Lynch, was a shock that sapped the vitality of the banker.
Mr. Lynch was a veteran banker of San Francisco. In August, 1917, Mr. Lynch became governor of the federal reserve bank. He was former president of the California Bankers' association and of the American Bankers' association. Mr. Lynch was 62 years of age and is survived by Mrs. Gertrude Louise Lynch and their son and daughter.

URGES AGREEMENT BETWEEN POLES AND CZECHO-SLOVAKS

PRAGUE, April 29.—A friendly entente with Poland looking toward the formation of a strong anti-German barrier which also would include Rumania and Jugoslavia, was urged by M. Klotak, Czecho-Slovak minister for national defense, in a speech here. The Czecho-Slovak republic, he added, would model its government after Switzerland and not after the communist regime in Hungary. The Germans of Bohemia would enjoy complete equality of rights.
The minister paid tribute to the political and economic assistance given Czecho-Slovakia by France and the United States.

FORMER HONDURAS ARMY OFFICER IS ARRESTED

SANTA ROSA, Cal., April 29.—Hernando Somozo, son-in-law of the late former President Sierra of Honduras and a former general in the Honduras army, is under arrest here on a federal warrant in connection with the alleged embezzlement of funds of the Santa Rosa National bank.

An indictment against Somozo in connection with the Santa Rosa National bank case was returned in Sacramento last week.

According to the attorney's office, it is charged that Somozo, a wealthy rancher and owner of large tracts near here, secured large sums of money from the bank through connections with Frank A. Brush, son of the late president of the bank, who is under arrest.

Somozo came here about six years ago. During the administration of President Sierra in Honduras, 1906 to 1908, Somozo was a general in the Honduran army and married one of Sierra's daughters.

MUST CALL SPECIAL SESSION SAYS LODGE

NEW YORK, April 29.—Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts, who passed through here Monday on his way to Washington, said he was convinced President Wilson would be compelled to call an extra session of congress before July 1, due to the failure of congress to pass necessary financial bills at its last session.

Senator Lodge refused to express an opinion on the revised text of the league of nations covenant until he had time to study it in detail.

Ben Denton, of Twin Falls, Idaho, put over a good booster speech. Mr. Denton is a prominent real estate and newspaper man of Twin Falls. He has been in La Grande several times of late and is much impressed by the possibilities of the little city. He suggested that what La Grande needs is something to develop community interest and thinks a loan and home building association would do a great deal for the future of the city and the community. With the resources La Grande has, he thinks she could very well use the services of a strong business man who would be engaged to apply himself to development of local industries.

Visiting Churchmen Speak

The most interesting part of the program seemed to have been kept over for the last of the season. Dr. Geo. Mecklenburg, of Helena, Mont., who has charge of the centenary campaign in the Methodist church for the Northwestern states, was introduced by the chairman and gave a brief, pleasing talk. Dr. Mecklenburg was speaking in the city this afternoon at a meeting in the Methodist church. He gave away, after a few humorous remarks, to Dr. J. M. Taylor, the noted Methodist missionary who is in the city to give a lecture this evening. Dr. Taylor's address contained a good supply of quaint humor also and was thoroughly enjoyed by his hearers. As a topic which would interest a gathering of business men he spoke for some time of the vacant or underdeveloped areas of the world, considering especially South America and the Malay archipelago. Dr. Taylor's extensive travels over practically all parts of the world added double interest to his words, inasmuch as it was quite evident that his facts came mostly from first hand knowledge. Dr. Taylor had a big subject to talk on and as he needed more time than the hour provided he stole a few extra minutes without the gathering objecting in the least. His address led one man to remark, "Well, we'd miss some mighty fine talks if it were not for these luncheons." Those who want to hear more from Dr. Taylor about the head hunters of the east will be able to do so at the M. E. church this evening.

The announcement that Dr. E. P. Moorman would be chairman next week was made by Chairman Snodgrass and the meeting then adjourned.

VOLPLANES 2000 FEET IN BLAZING AIRPLANE

Government Aviator Has Narrow Escape From Being Burned to Death in Flight.

NEW YORK, April 29.—With his clothing ablaze and flames rapidly mounting toward his face, Paul I. Ferron, 31, an aviator in the government mail service, volplaned 2000 feet to earth at Belmont park Saturday. Although he was badly burned about the body, his chances for recovery are said to be excellent.

Ferron took up one of the big planes—a rebuilt De Havilland four—for a tryout over Belmont field. Something went wrong with his engine and following an explosion it caught fire.

He was confronted with the problem of guiding his plane to earth slowly enough to avoid being dashed to pieces, and fast enough to save himself from burning to death in the air.

Ferron made a safe landing. The instant his plane touched the ground he jumped out and rolled on the ground to extinguish the flames. He managed to reach the plane and extinguished the fire before it could reach the gasoline tank, but not until the machine had been virtually wrecked.

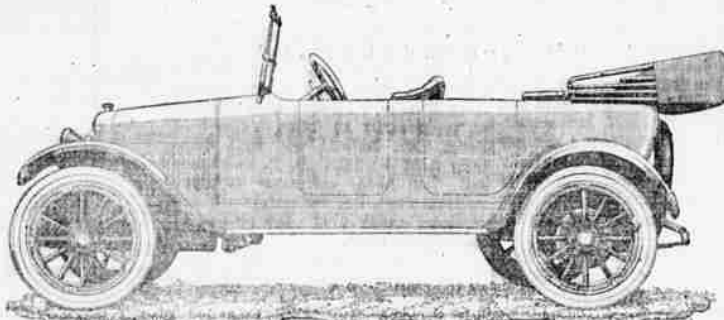
