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MISSIONARY MET WOLF BOY

DR. TAYLOR TELLS OF EXPERIENCE IN INDIA

Will Give An Illustrated Lecture in Methodist Church Tonight on Travels Abroad.

Dr. J. M. Taylor, world traveler and evangelist, who traveled 450,000 miles on a missionary tour and who is lecturing for the Methodist Centenary Committee, in an interview today gave the following jungle story of a wolf boy in India: "While in India a few months ago I took a trip into the jungle in South central India, two hundred miles from the railroad. All kinds of wild animals were plentiful on the route we were compelled to take through the jungle. Panthers, tigers, and wild boars ran across the road in front of us at night. Three of us sat in the motor car with guns on our knees for any emergency.

"This is the country Kipling wrote about in the story of his Wolf Boy Children abandoned by their parents or stolen by the wolves from homes, are brought up among the animals, thus finishing the basis for Kipling's story.

"While in this place, Jagdalpur, I enjoyed a visit with the real Wolf Boy whom a representative of the British government had found while out hunting. He has been in our mission eighteen months but previous to that time he had never seen a human face as far as he could remember, and although he was 15 or 14 years old, he had never heard a human being talk, he knew no language, did not even know how to walk as a human being walked, and ate like an animal—off the ground.

"When we first got hold of this boy, he was absolutely wild and would fight like a tiger, but during the time of my visit he had been much civilized and while I was there he gave his heart to Jesus Christ, saying to me after I had preached about the life of Christ, 'I want that kind of a God in my heart and life.' He then knelt down and prayed to Christ to save him from sin.

"The boy is intelligent, learns well in school, and has developed a kindness and disposition that has been a surprise to those who originally knew him in the state in which he first came to the mission."

Dr. Taylor will give his stereopticon lecture this evening in the First M. E. church. An interesting time is promised and everyone is invited to enjoy it. There will be no charge for admission.

DALLAS SOLDIER IN CHARGE OF WORLD'S LARGEST KITCHEN

Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Gardner, residing near Dallas, Ore., have received a copy of a French newspaper, printed partly in English, which describes the big army kitchen at St. Aignan, which has been the headquarters of the 41st division. Their son, Sergeant Willey M. Gardner, has been in charge of this kitchen. The newspaper article, in part, reads: "The largest kitchen in the world is at St. Aignan-Noyers, France, where 23,000 men are fed every day. Twelve cooks and 37 K. P.'s (kitchen police) serve a ton of beans at a meal, 210 cattils a week and 56,000 pounds of bread a day. Sergeant Willey M. Gardner, in charge, was personally complimented by General Pershing on his establishment, which served 100 men a minute three square meals a day."
