MARK UP NEW TRIUMPH FOR PEGGY HYLAND

A very convincing crook play will be shown at the Sherry theatre Saturday. It is called "The Girl With No Regrets," and has Peggy Hyland as its star. Miss Hyland as Signa Herick, orphaned, goes to live with her sister. She soon learns that her sister has married a crook and has taken to thieving with him. Of course, Signa runs away from them, and finally she obtains a position as secretary in a wealthy man's home. While the wealthy man is falling in love with her, her crooked brother-in-law decides to rob the house, which is known to contain a valuable collection of jewels.

It is an awkward situation when, as the wealthy sweetheart is placing an engagement ring on her finger, two burglars are watching him from behind portières. A mirror apprises the wealthy man of his danger, and the desperate fight that follows results in the overpowering of the crooks.

The wealthy man's half-brother and his wife scorn Signa because they fear she will disturb their own plans for getting the wealthy man's money. But their accusations against Signa amount to nothing beside the love of the wealthy man and the confession of Signa's sister that she and her husband are thieves, but that Signa is entirely innocent.

The play is beautifully photographed and the direction by Harry Millard is excellent. The acting of Miss Hyland marks another triumph for this talented and versatile star.

RESOLUTION

La Grande, Oregon,
April 6th, 1919.

The following resolution approved and adopted by our 275 members of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railway Shop Laborers of La Grande, Oregon, in regular session, April 6th, 1919:

Whereas, It is a known fact that the railroad owner is incapable of fulfilling the duties of public carriers with any degree of success.

Whereas, the management of different railroad systems, time and time again declared it was impossible to find the money for the betterment and upkeep of their properties and the improvements necessary for terminal and road facilities.

Whereas, under private management there was embargo after embargo placed upon necessary freight movements throughout the whole country.

Whereas, through private management and private manipulation there were many railroad systems placed in the hands of receivers.

Whereas, through state laws of various states there was uniformity of tariffs and restrictions upon railroads, which created little short of national disaster.

Whereas, under private management the worker was enslaved by low wages and poor working conditions without any redress except through strikes and the attendant inconvenience to the public.

Whereas, the private management of railroads maintained a policy of "public be damned" and this policy did not work either in the convenience or benefit of either shippers or receivers, thereby having a tendency to increase the cost of living to the workers and the public in general.

Whereas, the management under private controlled roads, impoverished the systems by paying high salaries to unnecessary officials and corporation lawyers and lobbyists.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That local Lodge No. 874 of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railway Shop Laborers of La Grande, Oregon, hereby demand that you, as Senators and Congressmen of the United States, elected by popular vote from this district do in the future make every effort in your power to have the railroads remain under government control or under government ownership.

It is further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to all our representatives, both in state and federal houses.

"THE ROMANCE OF TARZAN"

These students of modern screen craft who delight in dissecting successful cinema productions to discover the various elements that have been combined to produce enterprising value and box office appeal should find a subject worthy of their keenest attention in "The Romance of Tarzan," now showing at the Arcade theatre for a two day run.

This spectacular seven-part film drama presents the concluding chapters of Edgar Rice Burroughs' "Tarzan of the Apes." While retaining all of the picturesque and refreshing novelty of theme that set that production apart from other screen features of the day, "The Romance of Tarzan" offers, in addition, a

thrill-movie plot which excitement and suspense are deftly woven into natural sequence.

WAR ON SPECULATION

WINNIPEG, Man., May 2.—A bill prohibiting speculation in grain and other food products on Canadian grain exchanges has been prepared by the Manitoba Grain Growers' association and submitted to its parliamentary representative at Ottawa, R. C. Henderson of Macdonald, Manitoba.

For several weeks there has been agitation for drastic legislation. The Grain Growers' association adopted resolutions declaring "there is a certain element on the grain exchange at Winnipeg who are able in a very large measure to control the grain trade, depressing prices to the producer when they see fit, and boosting them after they have gained control of the grain crop."

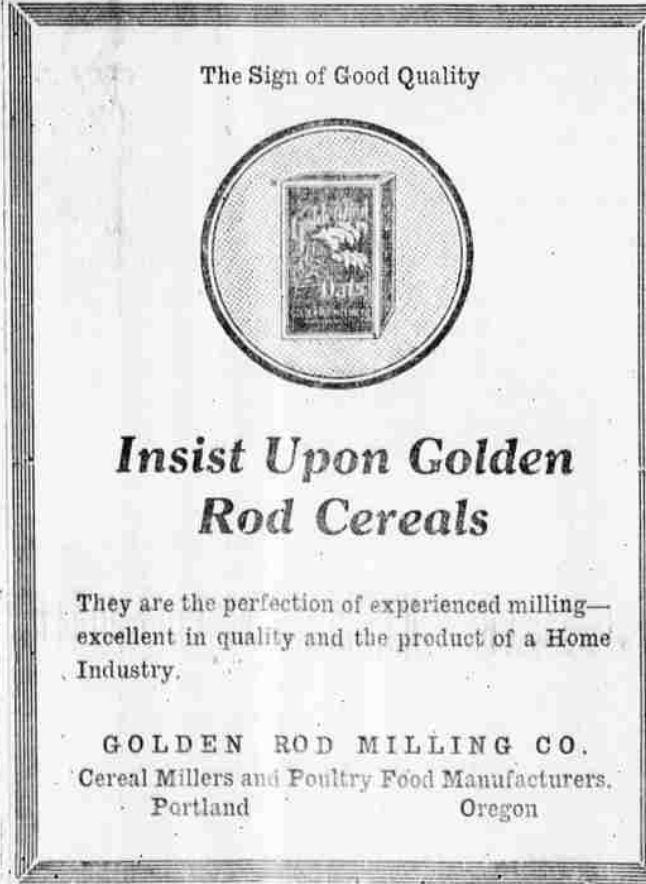

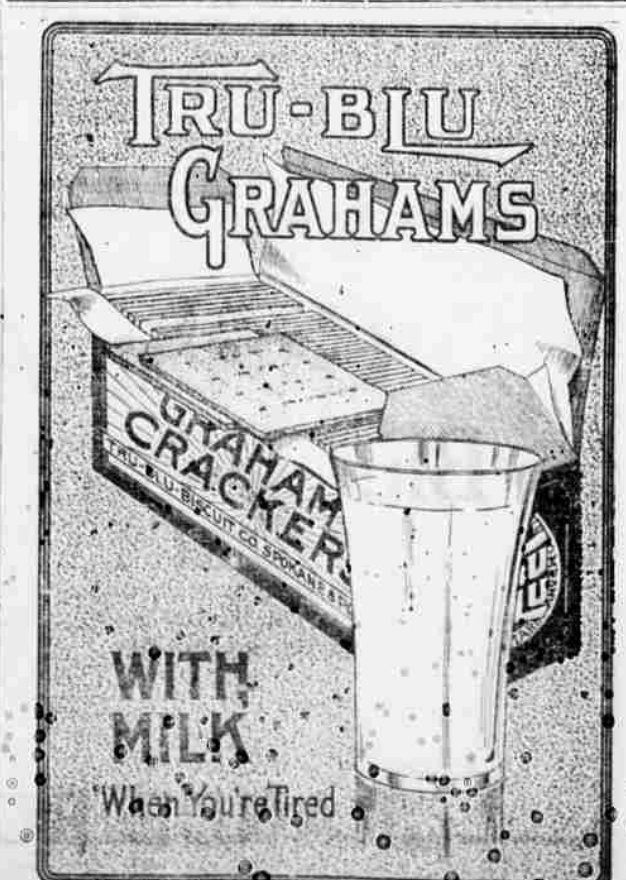
