LILA LEE QUICK TO MASTER
George Melford, who directed "The Cruise of the Make-Believers," in the new Paramount picture in which pretty Lila Lee makes her bow to the screen public, and which will be shown at the Arcade theatre tonight and Tuesday matinee goes on record as saying that the little star's quickness in learning the difficult aspects of screen acting is a little short of marvelous.

"Although she is only sixteen years old," said Mr. Melford, "I have found Miss Lee the most intelligent novice in screen acting that has been brought to my attention in nine years of directing.
