## THE DESTROYERS OF ARCHITECTURE

The Hun has called the attention of the world to the cathedrals and churches of France and Belgium in a manner quite out of the ordinary by his brutal destruction and coarse boasting of his atrocious deeds. His reports to the world of the number of churches and cathedrals destroyed sounds like the diabolical ravings of a maniac. Truly international become a "scrap of paper," as all that was holy, all that was revered by Christendom passed under the shell and shrapnel of the German.

But the Hun can claim all originality in the razing of buildings by war as the ruin which followed the Reformation, or the vandalism of Napoleon of nearly all the art treasures of Europe will testify.

The accidents of war destroyed the Parthenon by an explosion of gunpowder.

As the world mourns today the loss of much of the beauties one is inclined to think of war as the only destroyer and forget that other destroyers have laid hands on monuments of art throughout the history of the nations.

Time has wrought changes, colors have faded, inscriptions become obliterated and by the constant action the elements "warts and wrinkles," so-called by Victor Hugo, are worn into the smooth surfaces. Gravity, too, has taken a hand as destroyer and structures that were built for all time have disappeared or been pulled down by this powerful influence when the principle of thrust has been properly adjusted.

Rivers have changed their courses and either undermined and swept away structures, or buried some of the world's greatest monuments as the ancient temple of Olympus in Greece, or like the site of Troy which lies buried nine cities deep.

Earthquake and eruptions have played the part of destroyer as the ruins of Pompeii reveal their pathetic history.

Fire is ever one of the aides of the destroyer, as in the recent war, it was fire that finished the ruin of Rheims, wooden parts, draperies, furnishings causing such intense heat as to turn much of the stone and marble to lime.

The plunderer has carried away almost entire structures either to build other buildings or to satisfy other selfish reasons. The Coliseum became the quarry for centuries for builders in Rome or the mosques of Cairo were built from the casings of the pyramids of Egypt.

Restorations are not by any means the least of the destroyers. It is the idea of the new cloth on the old garment. A people can not interpret the mind or spirit that permeated the builders of a structure centuries old, the faces of the wounded soldiers, wonderful as the mask may be and like it is like the restorations made on him in every detail of form and color, yet the life and spirit that animated the very feature will be absent.
