START CAMPAIGN FOR GOOD ROADS

most of the work needed in Union county there would be nothing gained by holding one. The point is that at the elections June 3rd the six per cent county indebtedness bill must be passed by every county in the state and thus made law. Under that new legislation, Union county and the other counties of the state will be able to vote a sufficient amount to carry out their good roads programs. The market roads bill will make possible the construction of permanent gravel roads throughout the county as feeders to the paved highways.

State Will Pay Nearly Half

Representative Albert Hunter spoke in explanation of the market roads bill and E. J. Holmes gave a general talk on the good roads topic. He told of the cordial reception the proposition of the Ad Club received at the hands of the state highway commission and of the promise of that commission to do their share in paying the costs of building the roads. Of the total cost the state will pay one and a quarter millions of dollars, and it will be up to the county to raise by a bond issue the other million and three-quarters. As it has been explained before the county of Union must pay into the state treasury for good roads work, whether the bond issue is voted or not, approximately the sum that she will receive back from the highway commission if she does vote the bonds. Looking at it in that light it seems, therefore, that it is only a matter of plain economy for this county to go all the way through with the deal and build her roads.

Imbler Promises Support

The Imbler men present at the meeting seemed generally to be anxious to secure good roads and to favor the program that has been outlined. Jax Woodall, former representative at Salem, declared that the two bills would get the support of nearly all voters in that district. There was much criticism, he said, of the route chosen for the state highway, as it has been mapped through the mountains where it will be of no benefit to the people of the northern part of the county, whom it could have been made to serve with the addition of but a very few miles. The highway as planned will not benefit one person to the ninety or one hundred who would gain

advantage from it if followed the foothills. It was explained to him that the state required that this highway be laid in the most direct route and that no divergence could be secured for the accommodation of any one.

Elgin Next Tuesday Night

The Elgin delegation went home enthusiastic both in regard to good roads movement and to the workings of the Union County Ad Club and it was arranged that the La Grande good roads men will visit Elgin on Tuesday evening next week.

Tonight a meeting will be held at Alice, tomorrow evening at Union, Friday evening at Cove and Saturday evening at Tolsonnet. The same program will be followed on all of these occasions. The local men will leave the Y. M. C. A. at 6 o'clock and have dinner when they arrive at their destination. All who are interested will be accommodated, if they give their names to G. L. Larison.

RENT PROTESTERS RUN AFOUL COURT ACTION

Victims Are Protected From Summary Ejection in New York Without Due Notice

NEW YORK, May 1.—The courts came to the aid of victims of alleged rent profiteering Monday by refusing to permit landlords to effect tenants along upper Broadway and Riverside drives until the home leasers had been given a week to find new apartments.

Dispossession proceedings were brought by the landlords when the tenants refused to pay the higher rents imposed May 1, and hundreds of persons appeared in the municipal courts Monday to fight the attempt to evict them. The justices took cognizance of the scarcity of apartments in the city and refused to sign dispossession warrants when this excuse was advanced.

Tenants in some sections of the city said that if evicted they would be forced to put up tents in parks and on vacant lots.
