NITRATE BECOMES BUILDER INSTEAD OF A DESTROYER

War Munition That Has Been Converted to a Useful Purpose Since the Signing of the Armistice.
More than a hundred thousand tons of nitrate, originally produced to help in blowing the German armies off the map of Belgium and France, this year will be put to the more peaceful work of increasing the fertility of American farming soil. After the signing of the armistice the War Department released to the Department of Agriculture 111,000 tons of nitrate at a salvage price. To this quantity is added 40,000 tons received from Chile by the Department of Agriculture too late for distribution last year, so that in all 151,000 tons will be sold by the Department of Agriculture to farmers under the authority of the food control act, which provided for its purchase and sale by the government to farmers at cost.
Through this arrangement it is estimated that 100,000 farmers will save about \$1,500,000 according to the open-market price and the \$81 a ton f. o. b. shipping point charged by the government. Farmers have taken up the full 151,000 tons in orders ranging from a bag of 200 pounds to an order for 300 tons.
The price last year was \$75.50 a ton, f. o. b. shipping points, located at six Atlantic and Gulf ports. The Department of Agriculture last year arranged for the shipment of 120,000 tons from Chile, but shortage of shipping space kept the quantity transported in time for use last year down to about 75,000 tons. This year's price was announced early in 1915, and application blanks were sent to county agricultural agents for distribution to farmers.
Shipments are now being made from 21 storage points, and to date shipping instructions have been sent from Washington to forwarding agents covering about 125,000 tons. Records show that about 110,000 tons have actually been shipped, and it is expected that the entire 151,000 tons ordered by the farmers will be shipped before the end of May.
The Bureau of Markets, which is in charge of the nitrate distribution for the Department of Agriculture, has appointed at each storage point a forwarding agent and has charged him with the duty of even-weighting, reconditioning, loading, and shipping the nitrate on orders received from Washington. These representatives receive from the Department of Agriculture \$1 a year plus the regular commercial rates for services rendered.
Where county nitrate requirements are very light, farmers have been requested to forward cashiers' checks or New York drafts in payment for nitrate at the time of filing their applications, after which the nitrate is shipped direct to them. Where county requirements are comparatively heavy federal nitrate distributors have been appointed by the bureau, on the recom-

YANKEE ENTERPRISE SECURES CONTRACT

American Secures Contract Over English to Deliver Steel Rails.
LONDON, April 3.—(Correspondence of Associated Press.)—Yankee enterprise triumphed when the city of Birmingham, planning to replace its street car rails, invited bids for material. An American obtained the contract, although two British firms asked for it, and protests have been so numerous that the municipal government issued an official statement.
One of the British bidders, it was explained, agreed to begin delivering fifty tons a week in April but would not consent to a penalty clause for non-delivery; the other promised 120 tons within twenty weeks. The firm in the United States agreed to complete delivery by the end of May and quoted a lower price than either of the British manufacturers. The price and the fact that the authorities were very anxious to complete the work this year were the influencing factors in favor of the American bidder.
Sending American steel rails to Birmingham is like carrying coal to Newcastle, with the possible exception that the purchase by the city corporation of street railway rails made in the United States was because Birmingham thus got better rails than if the British product had been used.
Councilman Lee, called upon in the city council to explain the purchase, said rails recently supplied by British manufacturers had not been equal to the committee's standard, the life of such rails being five years instead of the normal life of fifteen years.
Alderman Bowley declared that this statement reflected on the British steel trade industry; and another member recalled that a rule of the council forbade the placing of an order with a foreign country when the value was more than \$5000.
The controversy ended when a resolution was adopted approving the purchase of American rails but reminding the committee of the existence of the rule regarding foreign goods and ordering its enforcement in the future.

MARRIED BY TELEPHONE

School Teacher At Ashland United to Man in Denver.
DENVER, Colo., May 7.—A high school romance begun in the town of Ashland, Oregon, resulted Easter Sunday in a wedding by long distance telephone, when Robert J. Thorne of Denver, and Miss Rose H. Thomas, a school teacher of Ashland, were married by the Rev. James Thomas. The wedding was kept secret until recently.
Standing at the Denver end of the telephone, the Rev. Mr. Thomas read the marriage service to Miss Thomas, standing at the Ashland end, after which she pronounced the promise to live, honor and obey. This was repeated by two witnesses in Denver, then the Rev. Mr. Thomas secured the required promise from Mr. Thorne, who was in Denver and the ceremony was over.
As a result of the difference in time, Mrs. Thorne will have one hour more of married life next year on Easter Sunday than the bridegroom. It was 11 o'clock in Ashland when the ceremony was performed. Again, while the bridegroom will remember his wedding day as a beautiful Easter Sunday, the bride will have recollections of a pouring rain.
The bride will join her husband in Denver at the expiration of the school term in Ashland.

DANES TAKE PRECAUTIONS AGAINST BOLSHEVIK MENACE

WASHINGTON, May 6.—All possible precautions against the Bolshhevik menace have been taken by the government of Denmark, said a cablegram received Monday by the Danish legation from the foreign office at Copenhagen. Russian propagandists have been expelled from the country, the Bolshhevik bureau of information in Copenhagen dissolved, and the circulation of Russian money forbidden.
Morris Weber and family have arrived at Roseburg from Christiania, Norway, after a miraculous escape from the Bolshhevik terrorists in Russia. Weber said that his home was seized and used by the leaders, who made use of everything they came to. He saw respectable law-abiding citizens shot down in cold blood and entire communities wiped out when they did not join the Bolshhevik army. He was near Moscow when one of the revolutions broke out, and was slightly wounded by a stray bullet.
Bloodhounds from the Oregon state penitentiary were not sent to Clarke county, Washington, to assist in the search for the men who robbed the bank at Washington. State Parole Officer Joe Keller would not recommend that the dogs be allowed to leave the state for the reason they might be needed here.
