MULES BURNED IN BARN

Forty Head, One Very Valuable, Lost in Farm Fire Near Pendleton.

Forty head of mules, one of them rated as the most valuable mule in the county were burned in a fire on the John F. Harvey place at 1 a. m. this morning, says the East Oregonian of Thursday. Thirty-seven of the mules were burned to death outright while another had to be killed immediately and it is questionable if the remaining two will not have to be killed. The mules were valued at between \$10,000 and \$12,000 and were insured for \$2000.

The origin of the fire has not been traced. When discovered, it was so far along that nothing could be done to save the barn or the mules. The barn valued at \$2500 is a total loss with all its contents. Insurance to the amount of \$1500 was carried on the barn and \$2000 insurance on the contents. The insurance was carried by the Bentley-Graham Insurance Agency.
