SENATOR PIERCE FOR GOOD ROADS

WENT WITH AD CLUB BOOSTERS TO COVE FRIDAY

The Two Good Roads Measures Freely Discussed and Well Thought of by Cove People

The good roads bill keeps rolling and continues to gather pushers as it travels. Senator Walter Pierce joined the crowd of boosters and accompanied La Grande's delegation of Union County Ad Club boosters to Cove Friday evening, thus lending great encouragement and giving much desired support of the Ad Club's good roads program.

There was a good attendance of Cove farmers at the meeting, although they did not arrive until the visitors from this city had done away with the excellent dinner that the Cove women had prepared for them. G. L. Larson acted as chairman of the meeting and as usual first explained his program, and Representative Albert Hunter and Fred Holmes followed with a talk on the two measures, the one mill market roads bill, which was favored by Senator Pierce, and the six per cent county indebtedness amendment. These three speakers all gave their usual good arguments in favor of the program of paved highways and gravelled market roads throughout the state.

It was left to Senator Pierce to give the real talk of the evening. He spoke in favor of the six per cent amendment and also was concerned with the market roads bill, which he is very anxious shall have the support of the people of the entire state at the June elections. Senator Pierce explained that he had been following his mules all day and was not in very good shape for oratory, but he succeeded, nevertheless, in delighting his audience with his speech and in impressing them of his sincerity in what he said. He spoke freely of the market roads bill and of his deep desire to see it made law; he spoke of his effort to have it passed two years ago and its defeat by influence brought to bear at the last minute from the western part of the state. The bill had been improved since then, however, and he had great hopes for it. He went into detailed statements of its workings, showing how a county could each year raise one mill on every dollar of the assessed valuation of its property and have that matched dollar for dollar by the state for the construction of gravelled market roads; with the provision that no county could receive more than \$100,000 yearly in this way. This bill, if passed, will look up every farmer with the paved highways which are surely going to be built throughout the state.

"The good roads movement is on us and we can not stop it," said the Senator, and added in effect that every voter might just as well make up his mind to get on the band wagon and go along with the procession. He declared himself in favor of the raising of the tax limitation, thus removing from the minds of many of his hearers fears that he would be inclined to fight it. The state of Oregon has a very ambitious program, the Senator said; she has now nearly reached the limit of the money the bonding law of the state will permit being raised, and if the state is to build the roads that are being planned the tax limitation must be raised. Paved roads must be built from California to the Idaho line, by way of Portland, he declared, to give this state the share of the tourist traffic from and to the east that is going to become of such magnitude during the next few years. The Roosevelt Highway idea was strongly supported by Mr. Pierce. He regarded it as a military necessity. The Japanese menace is more real than many people believe, and roads must be had to facilitate the movement of troops along the coast.

The Senator complimented the Ad Club on the fair and honest statements it has made about the good roads program. It is a fine program and a very desirable one, he thought; and he gave further pleasure to the La Grande boosters when he gave assurance that when the good roads program goes through he will pay his thousand dollars a year just as willingly as he paid his Red Cross contributions during the war.

The meeting closed after the perfect had been briefly discussed by Carl Stackland and others of the Cove men who were present.

Last night the good roads committee visited Telecast. Monday night they will meet the people of North Powder at that town, and Tuesday night they will visit Elgin.

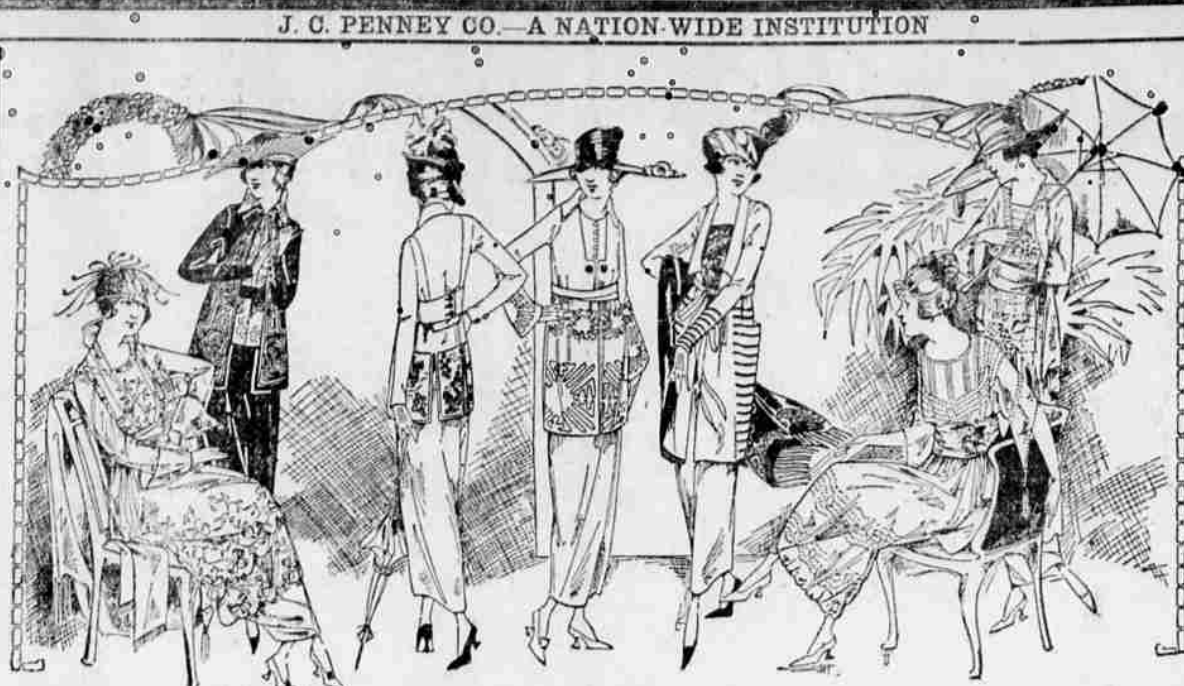
