WRESTLING MATCH TO BE ON MAY 20

Promoter John E. Anderson announced today that he has concluded all arrangements for a wrestling match to be staged at the Star theatre Tuesday, May 20. This match will bring together two of the leading heavyweights in the wrestling game.

Harold Christensen, better known throughout the east as Mike Howard, which name he adopted on account of several wrestlers performing under the name of Christensen in the east, and Peter Visser, of Ogden, Utah, will furnish the attraction. Visser is regarded as one of the best heavyweights in the northwest, and has made a great reputation for himself in the Rocky Mountain section and at Salt Lake, which is the leading wrestling center of the northwest.
