# At the Movies

**"THE BORDER LEGION" RICH IN PHOTOGRAPHIC NOVELTIES**

Seekers after novelties in motion pictures have a treat in store with the presentation of "The Border Legion" from the famous story by Zane Grey, at the Sherry theatre, tomorrow and Friday. The thrilling action drama of the west, produced by T. Hayes and distributed by Goldwyn, scetches with novel situations that are certain to make "The Border Legion" stand out as prominent among productions dealing with the rugged west.

Prominent among the novelties is the use of double exposures to illustrate the characters' conversations instead of the customary flashbacks. Half of the screen shows the actors in conversation while the other half reveals the situation about which they are talking. It is but one of the ways in which Mr. Hunter's attention to detail makes "The Border Legion" the novel, entertaining and up-to-the-minute motion picture triumph exciting critics have declared it to be.

When Zane Grey consented to having the most virile of his famous Western stories done for the screen he stipulated that his word picture of the Rocky Mountain territory be faithfully reproduced both in the scenic effects and in the acting. And the author, after viewing the picture, warmly praised the producer for his adherence to his instructions. The mountain scenery which Mr. Hunter chose for back-grounds is magnificent and the action is so set against it that the spirit of primeval, inanimate nature and that of the drama seem to blend perfectly.

As painstaking as he was in the selection of locations, Mr. Hunter was even more so in the choice of players to portray the unusual characters created by Miss Grey. In inducing Blanca Bates to forsake the speaking stage for a time and lend her art to motion pictures, Mr. Hunter succeeded where scores of producers failed. In this, however, Mr. Hunter was aided by Miss Bates' husband, George Creel, brilliant journalist, and chairman of the Commission on Public Information, who was eager to have the famous stage star lend her talents to the screen.

The celebrated star has a role much like the one in "The Girl of the Golden West" that first brought her fame. Co-starred in "The Border Legion" with Miss Bates is Harold Rosworth, who has no peer in the kind of role he is called upon to portray. A novelty, indeed, is the sight of two such eminent players brought together to depict situations that are both thrilling and realistic and, for the most part, situations that have never before been witnessed on either the stage or screen.
