## MONTANA MAN HAS QUAINY HOBBY

His Little Home Factory is Known Over the World.

BUTTE, Mont., May 15.—To have the "toys" which he started making as a means of diversion during his leisure hours, come into demand in remote corners of the earth, and to have them figure in the courts in important litigation is the experience of F. A. Linforth, a geologist and mining engineer.

In a little engineering mining shop in a corner of his home, Mr. Linforth, a graduate of the University of California, ten years ago began modeling, or folding, to be more exact, miniature models and card board. It became a hobby with him, and he became so proficient that he was able to reproduce on almost a "watch chain" scale, the vast and complicated inner works of mining plants. He made models of the largest mines of Butte so precisely that miners could point out the various stops or raises in which they worked.

An exploration company which is building a large smelter in Chile recently requested Mr. Linforth to make a papier mache relief map of the location of the proposed plant and to build on it the smelter. Without even having seen the ground, Mr. Linforth by means of surveys sent him, made a reproduction of the site, hundreds of acres in extent, and built on it the miniature smelter on which the company since has actually begun construction work on its South American property. This model was made on a scale of 100 feet to the inch.

Miniature duplications of mines have been ordered by mining men to be sent to New York and other large cities in order to interest financiers in properties for which capital was sought. The model of a smelter found its way to the University of Santiago, Chile, with the result that a communication came from this school asking Mr. Linforth to reproduce for it models of certain mines and smelters of the United States. As a result South American mining students at this university have before them in their class rooms, among other models the Great Falls, Mont. smelter in detail with every piece of machinery in place, and the reproduction faithful to the minutest detail.

In the Montana Federal court a law suit involving millions of dollars is at issue and Mr. Linforth's services have been sought to reproduce for examination in the court room small models of two of the largest mines in the Butte district. When the case comes to trial the court will follow the argument, which involves the title to various veins, by having the points mentioned in the testimony pointed out.

"My hobby never can become a business," said Mr. Linforth. "There is not enough mine construction to make it a commercial proposition because in a few weeks I can reproduce the miniature of a plant costing millions of dollars."

Several of Mr. Linforth's associates work with him each evening in his little home factory which is known in most of the technical universities of America and to the majority of the mining men of the country.

Tuttle weighs only 76 pounds and his height is four feet five inches. ## At the Movies

FAIRBANKS HAS OLD ROLE IN HIS NEW PHOTOPLAY

Douglas Fairbanks seems destined to secure another immense success in his new "Artistic" photoplay, "He Comes Up Smiling," which will be the attraction at the Arcade theatre Friday and Saturday. He created the original role of Jerry Martin, a tramp, in the stage version produced in New York in 1914. The screen story was directed by Allan Dwan and written by Frances Marion.

"He Comes Up Smiling," is the tale of a tramp, or rather a young chap who lives of existence as a bank clerk and seems to follow the life of a knight of the road. His adventures on the highway, his contact with other tramps, his defeat of a stock market scheme and his final winning of the girl of his choice, are the elements of a story so whimsical, even though that it is said to exhaust even those who love to laugh and grow fat.

One of Mr. Fairbanks' stunts is to leap across a ten foot creek, but this is the least exciting of his feats. Many of the stunts were photographed in beautiful Bear Valley, Cal., while others were made at Mr. Fairbanks' country home, with its swimming pool and classic offices. A ten-roomed house shown in cross-section is another notable effect. It is said that the athletic star never has had a sore which afforded him better opportunities for the display of his engaging personality and powers of vivid portrayal, while his ability and effectiveness are continually in evidence.

Mr. Fairbanks is splendidly supported, his leading woman being Marjorie Daw.

## HOBART BOSWORTH FINDS HIS GREATEST ROLE
