T. H. Green returned to his home in North Powder, Monday, following a visit with friends and relatives.

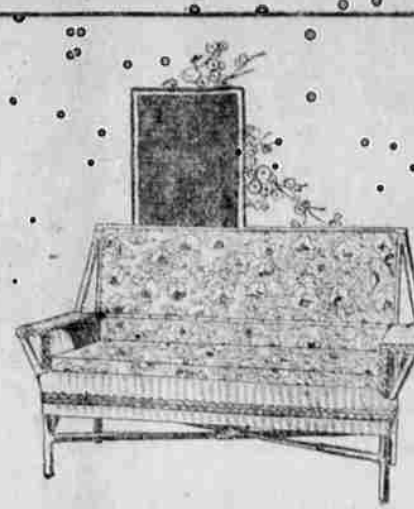

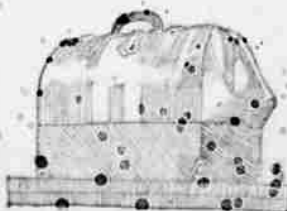
