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Fine Art Exhibit By The Grade Scholars

Visiting the art display at the grade schools in the city a few completeness of the exhibit and its excellence from every angle. The most remarkable of any of the work shown was perhaps that done by the pupils who were in their first and second years at school. Splendid exhibits were shown by all the grades, of course, but to any but those who habitually work with children the extent to which the little tots just entering upon their studies had managed to grasp and to carry out the ideas embodied in the work given them was quite a revelation.

The idea of the teachers and of the art supervisor, Miss Blanche Clark, was to correlate as much as possible this work with the lessons which the children learned from their text and story books. This was particularly easy of accomplishment in the reading lessons for the lower grades, for numerous stories were given that could be illustrated, but arithmetic also lent itself to this purpose insofar as the making of paper boxes and woodwork was concerned.

There was a splendid display of woodworking sent out from the manual training department. The various models were of excellent workmanship, all accurately constructed and very artistically finished off.

Schools Worked on Similar Lines

The work of the pupils in the three schools, Central, Riverin and Greenwood, was of necessity very much alike, all following the same chief course of instruction. The first grade pupils did the largest part of their work in paper cutting and modelling. In all the rooms there were toyland posters, drawn freehand with the toys which the children received at Christmas as models. These were very creditably done, also their George Washington posters, made of figures cut free hand from paper. Each room, however, had its special feature. Miss Leffel's pupils at Greenwood made as their special exhibit what they called an "oaks" amusement park. Everything in the park was cut from paper—the merry-go-round and the animals in it; the educated horse, which was supposed to

spell his name; the ferris wheel; the toy toy railway and truck; the house of witch and the leonardo booth; and even the fences around the grounds. This was all done with freehand cutting.

Features in Lower Rooms

Miss Adler's pupils in the same school, students for only six months, made a specialty of Japanese work. They had a Japanese village worked out on their sand table, with a miniature snow-capped Fuji-yama in the center of the scene; trees planted and lanterns hung about the streets and a floor of moss and grass under them; then to make the scene complete plasticine jarricks with passengers modelled in them and miniature men to pull them. Other work noted in this room was the Washington poster display and the picture delineation of the wind story.

The first grade in Rivera school, taught by Mrs. Neill, made a feature of Noah's ark, using paper cuttings to carry out the idea throughout here also. The animals were all represented and Mr. Noah was there very realistically himself. An equine scene was also well executed; the poster work was good and the Santa Claus, prepared at Christmas time, was special plates.

At Central school Mrs. Ingle's grade I featured a barnyard scene. Horses, sheep, cattle, chickens, geese and pigs—old ones and young ones—populated the yard and the stable in plasticine models, and a paper fence, cut freehand, surrounded them. Here their time for busy work was used to illustrate in paper cutting stories which they learned, such as the Fox and the Grapes, and others.

Miss Deul's room of grade 1A pupils made a one-acting "Kiddie" Circus as their special exhibit. The animal wagon and the snake wagon, with its coiled green snake, the big tent, and the candy and popcorn and the pink lemonade stands were all cut from paper. Inside the big tent were performers and equipment and in the parade there were even the colored minstrels. The posters telling of the story of the three wise men were very strikingly executed in this room and other

GEN PERSHING COMMENDS SALVATION ARMY
