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**JAPS NOT IMPLICATED.**  
TOKIO, April 15.—(Correspondence of Associated Press.)—The Japanese government has issued a denial of reports that Japanese are implicated in the Mongolian independence movement. The statement characterizes a "gross canard" the charge that the Japanese military officers are taking conjoint action with Colonel Semenov, and declares that from what Japanese military authorities have ascertained, that Colonel Semenov, the Cossack leader, emphatically denied all connection with the independence movement.

Two leaders of the Mongolian Independence party arrived in Tokyo the latter part of April to inaugurate a movement for the political independence of Mongolia and Manchuria and to unite those two Chinese provinces in one state.

**BERLINERS WELCOME PLACING OF BAN ON DANCING**  
BERLIN. (Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Police-President Ernst's prohibition of public dancing in Berlin has been welcomed by the great mass of citizens, whose indignation had been aroused not only by the great number of balls held nightly, but also by their character. One such ball, held recently, was a beauty competition. The dance-levy has been raising in Berlin since the war-time prohibition against public dances was withdrawn. Reports from provincial towns show similar conditions. The soldiers of aarrison in a small town in Brandenburg sent a delegation to the commanding officer to protest against requiring them to begin drilling at 8 a. m., when they had been dancing until 5 a. m.

**TRAVEL 18,000 MILES IN CANNABAL ISLES**

Craving adventure and actuated by a desire to record the manners and customs of the last stronghold of cannibalism, Martin Johnson travelled 18,000 miles among the Solomon and New Hebrides Islands and in the fourteen months of his travels secured some of the most sensational pictures of savage life that have ever been filmed. They have been assembled into "Cannibals of the South Seas"—a five-reel feature.

World rights have been acquired by Robertson-Cole Company and the production is being released through Exhibitors' Mutual exchanges.

Mr. Johnson set out from San Francisco in 1917 accompanied by his wife and after stops at Honolulu and Samoa he arrived at Sydney. Mr. Johnson had accompanied Jack London on the famous voyage of the "Snark" and was more or less familiar with the better known tribes of the South Pacific Islands. After two weeks aboard a small trading schooner Mr. and Mrs. Johnson landed at the Solomon Islands and from there they travelled in small schooners, whale boats and native canoes 18,000 miles among

the uncharted islands of the South Seas. They saw and photographed the most unusual people on earth, and many unbelievable incidents.

Their meeting with Chief Negapate, the murderous king of the "Big Numbers"—the most perilous experience of their trip—where they were led in landing by treacherous native guides surrounded by savages and escaped only by the timely arrival of a British battleship.

The Johnsons, whose expeditions were known in every civilized community of the South Seas, were reported killed by the man-eating savages of Chief Negapate's tribe, and when they started for San Francisco again with their treasures of moving pictures surprise was expressed everywhere that they were alive.
