That Promoter Anderson has provided another high class bill, there seems no doubt, for both men are well known in the sporting world.

Vesser arrived in town a few days ago and last night worked out before a good-sized crowd at 7:30 o'clock. The big fellow made a good impression by his fast work, and appears to be in excellent condition for a hard bout. That he will make his husky opponent go the limit seems a certainty. On the other hand, Howard is known throughout the entire country as one of the hardest heavyweights to beat in the game today. He has wrestled throughout the middle west and on the Atlantic coast the past year and a half, and when any man invades that section of the country at the grappling game and comes out all-together he's going some, for high class heavyweights abound in the middle and eastern part of Uncle Sam's domain.
