## State News

C. H. Flory of Portland has been appointed superintendent of the 20,000,000 acres of Alaska national forest.

Governor Olcott estimates that 80,000 licenses will be issued for automobiles in Oregon before the end of the year.

Governor Olcott made his position clear Saturday afternoon that a real unemployment emergency must exist before, as chairman of the state board of control, he will consent to issue any of the bonds proposed by reconstruction measures upon which the people will pass at the special state election June 3.

In an attempt to preserve the bandit's body as long as possible in order to give the greatest number of his former followers a chance to see it, it was packed in ice, in the absence of embalming fluids. The ice burst the sides and top of the flimsy coffin and gave rise to superstitious tales that the "Atilla of the South," as Zapata was called, was not really dead, but had burst his coffin and escaped.
