HOWARD WINS MAT CONTEST

Last night at the Star Theatre, Mike Howard (Harold Christenson) demonstrated that he is one of the toughest propositions in the wrestling game ever to appear before a La Grande audience on the mat. The big fellow took two falls out of three from Peter Vissor, of Ogden, after perhaps the hardest struggle between heavyweights ever staged here. And to lose to a man of Howard's ability does not in the least detract from the wrestling capabilities of Vissor, who showed a knowledge of the game that was well nigh a revelation to local followers of the grappling game.

Howard perhaps is the hardest heavyweight to beat in this section of the country. Many times during the contest last night he came out of holds fastened onto him by the Utah man, when only super-human strength and a thorough knowledge of the game would accomplish the task.

After the match, Vissor said that Howard was almost in a class by himself among the heavyweight wrestlers in this section. Today Promoter Anderson stated that he will endeavor to arrange a match between Howard and some top-notch heavyweight, to be held in La Grande at the near future. In the meantime, Mr. Anderson says that if any person can produce a wrestler to go against Howard, all that is necessary is to name the grapple, as no man is barred by Howard. This takes in the whole shooting match, from the present world's champion clear down the line.

The contest went to three falls, the first to Howard in forty-one minutes and twenty-six seconds, with a body scissors and half Nelson, while Vissor took the second fall with an arm scissors. Howard took the third fall in record time with a back-heel hold in forty-nine seconds.

The attendance was not so large as at some of the contests staged by Mr. Anderson, but everything was run off smoothly, as promised.

EXPLORER FACTS - FEROCIOUS CHIEF

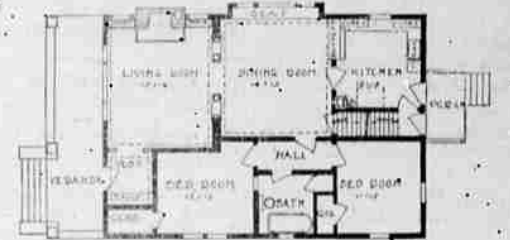
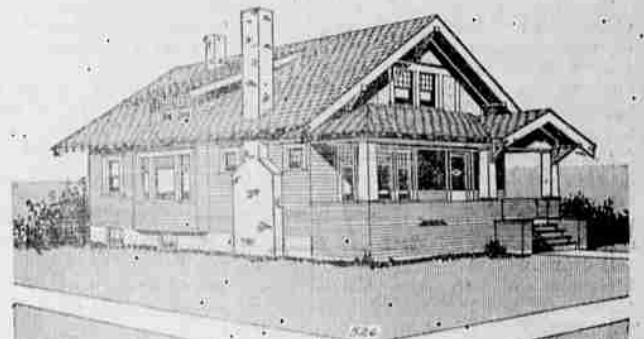
