VISITOR LIKES SCENERY ON LA GRANDE-JOSEPH TRIP

These fish were landed with a single gut leader and a No. 8 snell hook as C. N. had no idea he would hook fish of this size. Of course the big one got away, for one was hooked that departed with spoon, hook and leader.
