PORTLAND MASON TO LECTURE HERE THURSDAY NIGHT

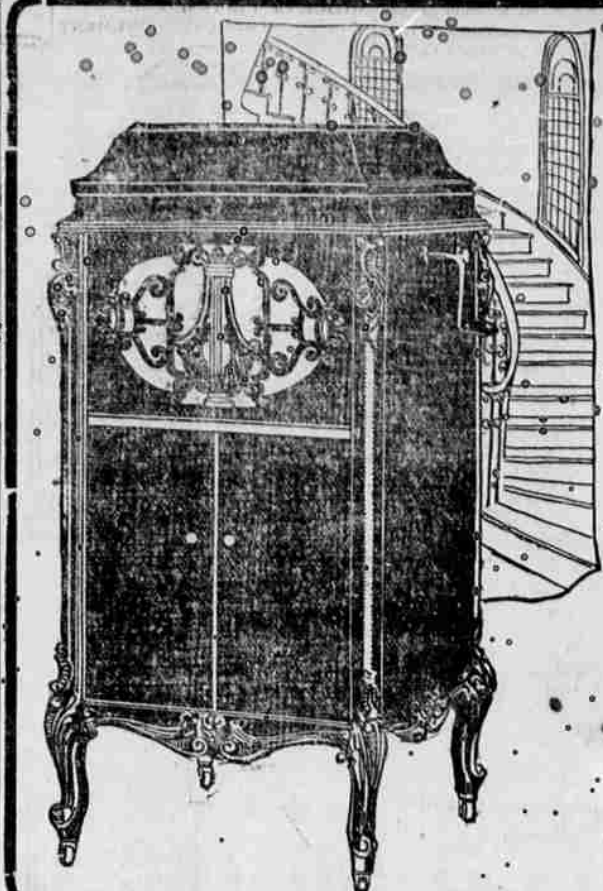

CANADIAN VETERAN HERE

State News

Maynard Smith of Crescent district in the Deschutes National forest has found a nest with eggs of the Canadian Jay or camp robber, the nests being very rare. He contemplates sending it to the Smithsonian institute. The nest and eggs carefully wrapped in cotton and packed in a clear box, are now in charge of the forest service.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Wiggins of London, England, are visiting at the Wiggins-Richardson hop ranch, in the southern part of Polk county. Mr. Wiggins is one of the owners of the ranch, which is the largest hop farm in the world.

With a shortage of teachers for next year facing the Eugene school board, due to the exodus of local instructors called to other places by higher salaries, W. R. Rathbun, superintendent of Eugene schools, is making scouting trips through the northern part of the valley in search of material. Several new teachers have been secured in Southern Oregon.
