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### FITTING TRIBUTE TO IDAHO HERO

Private Francis C. Niebauer, Recipient of Congressional Medal, Nephew of C. W. Nibley.

RECORD. May 29.—"Niebauer Day" at Sugar City, in honor of the homecoming of Private Francis C. Niebauer, was observed as a holiday throughout the Upper Snake River valley, from Idaho Falls north to the Montana line, Tuesday.

The train was met on arrival at Sugar City by thousands of people, three bands of music and hundreds of returned soldiers, who cheered the returning hero.

Niebauer, who is a very modest and unassuming young man, shrank from the publicity and sought his mother and father, who were there to meet

him. He was placed in a car with his parents and headed the procession to the city park, where the celebration was held.

Following his car were 250 returned soldiers in uniform, commanded by Adjutant-General Patch; Governor D. W. Davis, Justice Alfred Budge, Lieutenant-Governor Moore, State Senator W. L. Adams, and State Representative Stephen Hunt. Fully 500 decorated automobiles lined up the parade.

The parade disbanded at the park, where Governor Davis was introduced by Alfred Ricks and Frank B. Turner, president of the commercial club. Governor Davis, who was the first speaker, took advantage of the occasion to talk of what the soldiers of America had done and their duty now. He elicited the feeling of unrest throughout the industrial world, caused by

agitation on the part of those who would overthrow American institutions. The governor called upon the soldiers of America to do at home what they had done abroad to make America safe for democracy. He paid a tribute to the man of the day, Private Niebauer, saying that he, his home town, his state and his country paid Niebauer tribute for his brave action. The soldiery of Idaho were also eulogized by the governor, Justice Budge, Lieutenant-Governor, Adjutant-General Patch and Bishop C. W. Nibley, of the Mormon church, an uncle of Niebauer, also spoke.

There were calls from the crowd for Niebauer. The young soldier came to the front of the platform, and in a modest way began a story telling in a general way of the fighting qualities of the American soldiers. He was interrupted by the crowd, who called to

him, "Tell us how you did it, Tam." Then the young soldier told of the experience which resulted in his congressional citation.

Niebauer is one of the 17 men of the American army so honored.

### Perfume Their Dead.

Natives of Torres Strait islands, to the north of New Guinea, have some peculiar burial customs. One is the unloading the bodies with cheap perfume, the remainder being corked in the bottle and left on the grave. In some cases a cheap stone is set on the grave and this ceremony is usually marked by a three-day "rage" on the part of the relatives of the departed, but, jams and turtle being shaken down to make room for more by vigorous dancing and singing.

### The Stormy Petrel.

The birds known to sailors as Mother Carey's chickens, whose appearance is supposed to foreshadow a storm, are otherwise known by the term stormy petrel (Thalassidroma pelagica). The bird seems to rim in a remarkable manner along the surface of the sea, where it picks up its food. The petrel is a small bird of dusky plumage, nocturnal in habit, most abundant in the southern hemisphere. The name Mother Carey is supposed to be a corruption of the "Mother Car"—dear mother—of Levantine sailors.

### Vegetable Wax.

A Japanese industry which has made remarkable progress in recent years is that concerned with the extraction of vegetable wax, which is coming into greater demand on foreign markets.
