Commissioner Grandy, Special Engineer Kelsey, City Engineer Neal, Water Superintendent Black and the manager made a trip to Beaver Creek Saturday May 24 to look over the water situation at that point. We found an ample supply of water, the reservoir full and running over the spillway at the main dam. The pumpback well at the dam was backing badly and allowing considerable water to escape. At the intake the pipe was running full with a good head above the pipe. At the upper end of the lake or main reservoir there was an abundant supply of fresh clear water running into the reservoir from Beaver creek.

A visit was also made to the fall of water and west of Beaver with a view of ascertaining if the supply of water for the city could be taken from this point. The pipe line was examined for some distance from the intake but no obstructions or leaks were found in same. However, as the pipe is not delivering sufficient water for the city's requirements, it is the opinion of Mr. Kelsey that the same should be seen over thoroughly. In the future distance. He recommends also that the line be surveyed to ascertain the different levels and size of pipe used. Since our return the water in the reservoir at Beaver has been lowered and it is found that there is a break in the penstock of well about two feet square. This can be repaired at a small expense. We find, also, that the reservoir south of town leaks badly and this should be repaired if we are to conserve all the water that reaches the city. Mr. Kelsey recommends that this reservoir be lined with concrete of four inch thickness.
