NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Notice is hereby given to all concerned that the City of La Grande, Oregon, intends and proposes to improve Walnut street from the north property line of Washington Avenue to the north property line of Main Avenue in said city, by excavating and grading the same to grade in accordance with the plans and specifications adopted therefor on May 14th, 1919; that the boundaries of the district to be benefited and affected by the proposed improvement are finally adopted by the Commission as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the southwest corner of lot 7 in block 7 of Romig's Addition to La Grande, Oregon, and running thence north along the center line of block 7 of said Romig's Addition, and continuing along the center line of the alley in block 12 of Grandy's Second Addition to La Grande, Oregon, to a point on the center line of said alley at the northeast corner of lot 13 in said block 12 of Grandy's Second Addition, thence west along the north line of said lot 13 and continuing along the north line of lot 4 in block 13 of Grandy's Second Addition to the center of the alley at the northeast corner of said lot 4 in block 13 of Grandy's Second Addition, thence south along the center line of said alley to and along the center line of block 12 of said Romig's Addition, to the southeast corner of lot 6 in said block 12 and thence east along the north line of Main Avenue to the place of beginning; that the preliminary assessment for said proposed improvement has been made and is now on file in the office of the City Recorder and the Commission of said City will meet on Saturday, the 14th day of June, 1919, at eight o'clock, P. M., at the commission room in the city building in La Grande, Oregon, and hear and determine all objections, remonstrances and claims of grievance by any persons interested.
