**ENGLAND KEEPS WORD TO SOUTH AFRICAN UNION**

LONDON, June 11.—Great Britain cannot take any action which would mean the disruption of the Union of South Africa. This, in effect, was the answer given to the deputations of the Nationalist party of South Africa by Premier Lloyd George in Paris on June 5.

The premier received the deputations which included General J. B. M. Hertzog and Judge F. W. Reitz, the former president of Orange Free State. It was explained that the chief object of the National party was to obtain recognition of the national status of the South African republics existing before the Boer war.

Mr. Lloyd George in his reply said that the south African union was based on a fundamental agreement between the British and Dutch elements and could not be dissolved by one element without the consent of the other. Great Britain therefore was unable to take any action which meant the disruption of the union.

**BELA KUN ACCEPTS INVITATION TO PARIS**

GENEVA, June 11.—Bela Kun, according to an Innsbruck dispatch, in reply to Clemenceau's note, "accepts the allied invitation to visit Paris, in order to explain conditions in Hungary."

Bela Kun, it is added, will shortly appoint a delegation which he probably will lead himself.

Violent fighting, it is declared, continues between the Hungarians and Czech-Slovaks.

**MEXICO SEEKS AID TO ENTER LEAGUE**

WASHINGTON, June 11.—General Carranza, son-in-law of President Carranza, who is now in Washington, came to the United States to enlist the American government in obtaining admission for Mexico to the league of nations, according to advices Tuesday from Mexico City.

General Aguilar called on Acting Secretary Polk Tuesday and later conferred with Henry P. Fletcher, American ambassador to Mexico.

**ROAD PROGRAM IS PROGRESSING**

The Month of May Sets a New Record in Number of Projects Approved in United States

WASHINGTON, June 11.—During May the secretary of agriculture approved project statements for 124 federal aid projects, involving the improvement of 750.87 miles of road at a total estimated cost of \$15,120,177.00, and on which federal aid in the amount of \$6,382,081.38 was requested. This represents the largest number of project statements approved during any month since the passage of the Federal Aid Road Act.

During the month there were executed by the secretary and the several state highway departments 81 project agreements, involving the improvement of 667.71 miles of road at a total estimated cost of \$7,992,867.25, and on which \$3,570,987.22 federal aid was requested and which has been set aside in the treasury. In addition, agreements to cover 59 other projects were placed in process of execution during the month.

Up to and including May 31, 1919 project statements for 1,188 projects had been approved. The 1,188 projects involve 11,350.10 miles of road, a total estimated cost of \$108,295,329.15, and a total of \$49,076,167.63 federal aid. On the same date 617 project agreements had been executed, involving 5,281.86 miles of road, at a total estimated cost of \$47,426,749.49, of which \$19,531,259.27 was from federal funds.

**MONTANA HAS GOOD ROADS DAY**

HELENA, Mont., June 11.—Tuesday, June 17, has been designated as Good Roads Day in Montana this year in a proclamation issued by Gov-

ernor Stewart. He urges the people of the state to set aside the day for highway improvement and he expresses the opinion that the residents of Montana fully realize the importance of good roads.

In years past it has been the custom of the citizens to turn out in large numbers, clad in working clothes, and push in the day on the highways, tangible results, being achieved.
