NEW ZEALANDERS TO BE WELCOMED

AUCKLAND, New Zealand. (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—The battalion of Maoris, New Zealand aborigines, who fought in the Gallipoli campaign and afterward in France, has been welcomed home with a great feast, haka (war dances) and tangi, or lament for those who fell in battle.

The Acting Prime Minister, Sir James Allen, told them, "You Maoris hold a proud position. You have got one concept." From the time of its formation early in the war the Maori battalion was maintained at a strength of 1,200 entirely by voluntary enlistment.

Great quantities of mutton, beef, pork and other food had been baked in earthen ovens for the occasion. About 2,000 Maoris in all shared in this feast. There were several pots of native coffee, and

The tangi was a scene of much emotion. The soldiers sat by tribes, led by their chiefs, the men and women with low, wailing chants for those of their race who had perished. All the treasures of the Maori had been brought from their native homes for the welcome. There were also

payments, gifts, chiefs' head-dresses and beautiful kites. The chiefs of the various tribes delivered speeches of welcome couched in Maori South Sea language, after which there was a haka by the famous Arawa tribe and the speech of welcome by Sir James Allen.

ENGLISH SCHOOL ENDOWMENT

CAMBRIDGE, Eng. (Correspondence of The Associated Press)—Two hundred thousand guineas have been contributed by three oil companies and several private individuals for the endowment of a clerical school at Cambridge University. It is expected that this endowment will place the clerical side of the University in the forefront of the world's research work. This faculty will be reorganized by Prof. H. Pope.

A VALUABLE GOAT

POMONA, Cal., June 11.—A goat owned by W. W. Coates, of this city is worth more than her weight in gold every ten days, according to her owner's announcement after she had completed a ten-day endurance test. Weighing less than 100 pounds, the small creature gives ten pounds of milk a day, a record equalled by only four other goats in Southern California, it is said. She is three-quarters Toggenburg and one-quarter Saanen.

HAD NUMEROUS DESCENDANTS

PRESTON, Idaho, June 12.—Genealogical statistics concerning Samuel Ross Parkinson, who died here May 23 in his eighty-ninth year, numbered his descendants at 112 children, grand-children, great-grand-children and great-great-grand-children. Mr. Parkinson was an early pioneer of Utah and southern Idaho and is said to have been one of the few remaining members of the Mormon church in this section who had more than one wife at the same time.

PAYMENTS PROHIBITED

LONDON. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The treasury has authorized the transmission to persons and firms resident in enemy territory of statements of their accounts. Payments of money to enemies remains prohibited and statements of accounts sent to them must be accompanied by notice that persons and firms in enemy territory will not be permitted to dispose of funds or securities held for their account in this country at the date of the beginning of the war.

NEW MATERIAL FOR PAPER

MEXICO CITY. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Experimenters conducted by Canadian capitalists have, according to published reports, shown that from the leaves of the banana tree can be

manufactured a low cost and excellent class of "candere" paper. Members of the industry are understood to be awaiting the arrival of machinery to establish their first plant at a Pacific coast port within easy reach of the banana producing districts of Mexico.

DRIVE FOR TENT CATERPILLARS

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Now for the big drive to get the "tent" caterpillars, those webby things that hang in the trees in June. This is the time at which the boys and girls have the best kind of fun, says the American Forestry Association which urges that organization be affected by block formations in order to rid the trees of the pests. "The tents," says the association, "are common at this time on wild cherries, mulberries, willows and other trees. Apply a burning rag or torch to the web or else squirt a little kerosene into the web. This should be done under the proper supervision in every case."

A suggestion for June is to "spray" for tent eating insects, for more of them commence defoliation at the end of May. Spraying for sucking insects is urged and advice along these lines will be gladly given to any who write to the American Forestry Association, Washington, D. C., and enclose a stamp for an answer.

RAILWAY CONCESSION WANTED

MEXICO CITY. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Foreign mining companies of Sonora, acting together, have asked the Department of Communications for a concession to construct a railway connecting the mines Sonora with Rosar, on the Gulf of California. It is proposed to connect the new line with American railways at the border and the politicians claim it will open up rich and undeveloped mineral districts.

WHALE FISHING IS POOR

ABERDEEN, Wash., June 12.—The whale catch off the Washington coast this season is not up to the average, only 19 of the mammals having been taken so far. But as July, August and September, the three best months are yet to come whalers believe the catch will tally with last years, which was 200. Only three whaling vessels are operating from this port this year while four were on duty during 1918.

BELLINGHAM CELEBRATION

BELLINGHAM, Wash., June 12.—The Old Settlers' Association of Whatcom county is planning a reunion celebration to be held at Ferndale August 7, 8, 9. The celebration will be termed the "Victory Celebration."
