STRIKE SET FOR MONDAY IS OFF THINK-GERMANS READY TO SIGN

ELECTRICAL WORKERS' UNION GAINS POINT.

Issuance of Order by Burleson Permitting Collective Bargaining.

COUNCIL OF FOUR REAG FINISHES THEIR REPLY.

German Negotiations Believed to Be No Longer a Possibility—Bismarck States Admission.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Orders calling off the strike Monday of electrical workers were issued tonight by J. P. Neenan, acting international president of the Electrical Workers' Union, after issuance of orders by Postmaster General Burleson, granting employees of telegraph and telephone companies the right to bargain collectively.

TELEGRAPHERS ENCOURAGED.

CHICAGO, June 14.—Calling off of the electrical workers' strike, which had been set for Monday, following an order issued by Burleson, permitting telegraph employees the right to bargain with their employers and to organize will only lend encouragement to the striking commercial telegraphers, S. J. Koenigsberg, international president of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union at America, asserted tonight.

"The commercial telegraphers are virtually fighting for the same thing that has been conceded to the telephone workers," he said. "If this order is to be confined to the telephone companies it would be a case of granting one labor policy for the telephone companies under government control and another for the telegraph companies. The result at Washington will not change our situation."

While Western Union and Postal officials say strikers are returning to work daily, the union officials claim not less than 2,000 men are out.

FIRST WOUNDED BROUGHT IN.



LABOR PROTESTS ON PROHIBITION

A crowd of several thousands, said by labor officials to represent union men in every state, came by special train for the flag day protest meeting and choral declarations that the people never had been given opportunity to express themselves on prohibition. Applause greeted every prediction that the ban on beer and wine would increase unrest among the masses.

Three representatives, John F. Fitz Gerald, Boston, and Adolph K. Smith and John W. Rainey, of Chicago, all Democrats, addressed the meeting predicting that if congress did not modify the July 1st law, President Wilson would do so by proclamation. They agreed there was little prospect congress would act.
