Elliott Dexter, urbane, dignified, refined, yet skillful in his depictions of the heart, plays the role of Nicholas Elliot in "Women's Weapons," Ethel Clayton's newest Paramount picture, which will be shown at the Arcade theatre tomorrow only. State News
