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his body by a belt. When he did not return after a couple of hours, the family became anxious and his father set out to search for him.

Going some distance from the house the father finally saw his son's horse and after some search the body of his son, stretched out on the bank of a small gully and quite dead. The bridle and oats and his gun were lying beside him and there was a bullet wound below his jaw. He immediately called Coroner Hal Bohnenkamp from La Grande, and the coroner arrived at the scene of the accident a short time afterward. No certain explanation of the manner in which the accident occurred could be discovered. The theory of suicide was not entertained, for the reason that there was no reason known why the young man should have occasion to take his life, and the position of the wound, moreover, indicated an ac-

cident. It is the coroner's belief that young Bartmess had sat down on a log on the bank of the gully to shoot at the ground squirrels which were tick in the gully. The gun, when found, was partly out of the scabbard and it is thought that it might have been cocked and exploded as it was being drawn out. There was no powder burn on the flesh about the wound.

The body was brought to La Grande by the coroner and is at the Bohnenkamp chapel awaiting the making of funeral arrangements. On examination of the remains here, the bullet was found to have gone through the head and brain and to have lodged just under the skull on the top of the head.

Young Bartmess, though in the service for quite a long time, had not been overseas. He was on the way across, however, when the armistice was signed and his ship recalled. He was a member of the 62nd Infantry, to which some unit Lynn Bohnenkamp, of this city, belonged.

## AID FROM CITY FOR CAMP SITE

used on other streets where congestion often occurs. While the provisions of the ordinance were not finally settled, it is likely that parking of cars on Adams, between Fourth street and Greenwood will be entirely prohibited at all hours of the day, and the regulations will likely be made affecting other streets in the city. In this connection it was stated the state highway commission had practically agreed to route the new highway through La Grande on Adams avenue, provided the city would make a rule prohibiting cars being parked thereon.

Two cases mentioned, to which attention was said to be needed, were on Spring street, at the Methodist church where cars parked in the narrow portion of the street block it almost entirely and make it an unsafe spot, and on Washington street at Zuber hall where the street is usually full of cars on nights when dancing is in progress.

One suggestion made was that cars be made to park parallel to the curb, instead of angling into the street, as they do at present. This rule, with the requirement that a distance of four feet be observed between each car and the one ahead and the one behind it was thought to promise more safety than the present rule gives but it was not adopted. The ordinance was read the first and second times, and will be amended and brought up again next week.

Adams Avenue in Bad Shape. Commissioner Grandy asked if the city had finished the work of repairing the streets. The macadam on Adams avenue, from the end of the pavement to the hospital, was in bad shape and became worse every week he said, being filled with holes. The city manager stated that he had been seeking expert advice regarding having the street surface put in good shape again, but had been unable to get anything satisfactory so far. The question of hard-surfacing that part of the avenue was mentioned and it was stated that if the state highway should connect with Adams avenue the hard surfacing would certainly be done.
