An orphan girl living with a family in La Grande was taken down with smallpox a few days ago. As one of the members of the family had never had the disease, it was only natural that they should ask to have the girl removed from their home. After a good deal of delay and apparently with a considerable reluctance to act, the girl was finally placed with a family who were immune on account of all of them having had smallpox.

The incident only emphasizes the fact that this contagious disease situation is not a matter to be trifled with or passed over with indifference. It is squarely up to the authorities to provide for patients with contagious disease. Primarily it is their business to attend to such things; that's what they are for. Then there may be at some time such danger to the public in general, with perhaps a well established claim for damages that will cost the city many times over the expense of providing in a humane and respectable way for the smallpox patients and for any and all other cases of contagious disease.

BOSNIA PEOPLE ARE DESTITUTE

Great Difficulty Experienced By Neutral Authorities Locating Cases of Contagious Disease.

City Associated Press to The Observer: SPALATO, Bosnia, June 19.—(AP)—Fifteen per cent of the population in Bosnia is absolutely destitute. Typhus is on the increase both in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Although only 500 cases of typhus are officially reported the American medical authorities believe that there are more than 2000. Great difficulty is experienced by the authorities in locating Mohammedan homes where three-quarters of the cases are believed to be concealed.

M. Mohammedan women refuse to be treated by male doctors because they consider this dishonouring. Many of the Christian natives think it unbecomingly to have the attention of a woman doctor. "We are old and old to die," the sick Mohammedans shout when told that they will be treated. "Why do this to us?" "Because if a woman doctor had seen us we would have died."
