ROME, June 20.—Prince Ven De-roy's house on the Pincian hill, known as the "Villa of a Thousand Kings" or "Kings," is ready awaiting the return of the German diplomat. The villa was called by its present name because of the lavish profusion, both in number and variety, of the roses climbing the walls and studding everywhere in the garden.

They are blooming now and present a magnificent appearance. There are types of roses among the collection probably unknown in America. There is the celebrated Italian orange rose of mixed colors, chief among them being the "rosa novita," a rose of red and orange and yellow. There are multitudes of red, white, pink and yellow roses. They fill the garden giving it an artistic appearance and filling the atmosphere for blocks away with their sweet-smelling aroma.

The gardener is still at work in the von Buelow villa. When his work of attending to the tender plants is finished for the day, he sits near the high gate at the entrance in an attitude of expectancy, wondering how long the arrival of peace will detain his master, who has expressed in a recent interview his desire to return to Italy to see his roses.

PENNIES TO APPEAR IN ALASKA

DOUGLAS, Alaska, June 20.—"What would the old pioneers of this land of gold say if they saw a friend coming in from a trip to the mines with a poke of dust, walking up to a bar, ordering an ice cream soda and paying for it with four nickels and a rusty penny?" Douglas "sondoughs" asked when the news reached here that pennies would be put into circulation in Alaska to enable residents to pay the government's tax on so-called luxuries.

Lowly copper pennies, which have long been curiosities in Alaska where they were never even given

the name or dignity of "chicken feed" are slowly being brought to use in the northern territory, much to the disgust of the "old timers." This was the "sondough" way, when the five cent or "two-bit" piece was the smallest coin used in all Alaska. At this day in the interior of the territory dimes and nickels are seldom seen.

Always, of course, pennies have been accepted by the post office for stamps. Keyways of the road houses and business places in the towns and cities would look twice at a man who would offer them pennies in barter.
