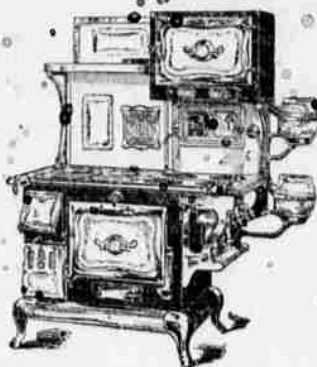

DOGS AND HENS ARE WISER

Physician Arraigns the Modern Practice of Treating Influenza Patients.

New Orleans, La.—When a dog gets sick, what's the first thing he does? He sticks his nose between his hind legs. What does he do for? So that he can breathe the warm air. When a chicken gets sick, the first thing it does is to tuck its head under its wing—so that it can breathe the warm air. Physicians who advocate the cold-air treatment for the "flu" have less sense than either dogs or chickens.

Such is the opinion rendered by Dr. Cooper Holmshaw of Chattanooga, formerly president of the Association of Surgeons of the Southern Railway. He said it before the hundreds of surgeons who attended the twenty-third annual meeting of the association, held in this city.

He was arraigning the modern practice of treating influenza patients in the open air. He insisted that the best treatment for influenza is to keep the patient under such conditions of care and freedom from exposure as were wont to obtain when our mothers of the old school used to treat the measles.

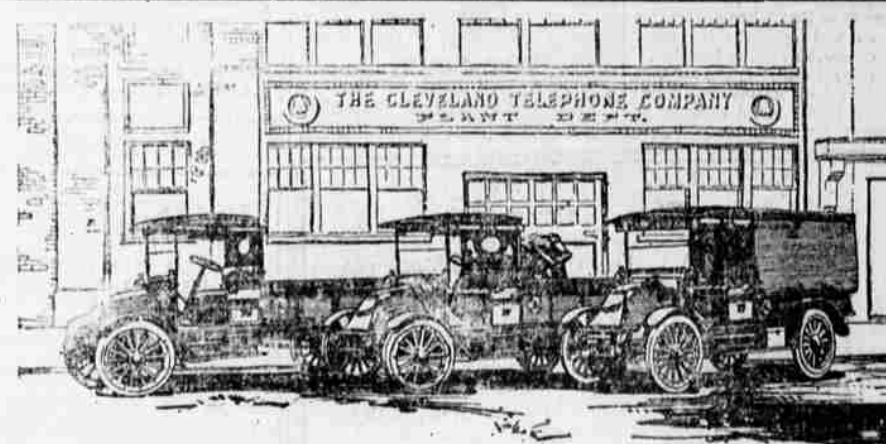
