Gooding College Plans to Erect This Year a New Boys' Dormitory

GOODING, Idaho, June 20.—Besides strengthening the teaching force and the respective departments of the school in many ways, the trustees of Gooding college have authorized a campaign for \$150,000 to build and equip a boys' dormitory this year.

The school now has splendid quarters for the girls and for recreation work but an increase of over 200 per cent in enrollment has already filled these. The soldiers boys are returning and it must be remembered that Idaho, according to its population, sent more men to the front than any other state in

the Union. Hence the school must have a new building or fail to do its share in the work of the reconstruction period.

Besides its fall term, which commences Sept. 5, the school is starting a summer session this week in which emphasis is being placed on shorthand, typewriting, high school

branches and county certificate schools. Then, when the Methodist Conference meets at Weiser this fall, Thursday evening will be given over entirely to Gooding college. A banquet will be served, and addresses will be given by men prominent both within and outside the state.
