MANY BIG SCENES IN "UNPARDONABLE SIN"

There are "big scenes" without number in "The Unpardonable Sin," which is to be shown at the Sherry Theatre June 25 and 26, but "big" in point of interest and suspense, though paradoxically, "small" in point of characters involved, is the gripping scene, which has been attracting the attention of the public wherever the tremendous photoplay feature has been exhibited.

In the development of the story, Blanca Sweet, appearing as Diana Ferris, an aggressive American girl, in company with Matt Moore as Noll Wilson, an American working with the German Commission in Belgium, finds herself entering the military lines and forced to submit to the most careful search of law person for possible hidden documents. Methods used in making these military searches have received sufficient publicity to make the average man familiar with them, and it is points sensibly known that, but little respect was paid to the feelings of modesty, which were natural on the part of women who fell into the toils of those called to make the search.

In "The Unpardonable Sin," Miss Sweet is shown alone in a room with one of the most repulsive characters that has ever been represented on the screen. Accidentally coming down to the last film screened, but clothing removed, despite her protests and despite her desperate struggle. Italian Soldiers of the A. E. F. Released Overseas Must Pay Way Back

ROME. (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—Discharged members of the American Expeditionary Force of Italian extraction have been ordering Consul Francis Koenig's office here recently requesting passage back to the United States on the grounds of being United States citizens and of having served in the United States army. Employees of the office attending to the list of these discharged soldiers immediately demand to see their discharge papers. After examining it they indicate to the men that they have waived the responsibility of the government in providing transport to them when they received their discharges, for there is one clause on the back of the paper which clearly explains that procedure.

"Oh," replied the men, "but my commanding officer did not explain that to me when I asked for a discharge."

"That will do old-timer," returns the consul general's assistance. "Your commanding officer certainly told you that and now we can do nothing about it."

The men, in every case, secured their discharges to visit their parents or other relatives here for an indefinite period and thereby waive high to return transportation.

Early American Post Offices.

In 1775 the first post offices in Maine were established at Kennebec, Falmouth and Bath. The mails were carried by carriers on foot or on horseback and the average week's mail did not amount to five letters at each office. The rates were high, 64, 12 1/2, 18 1/2, 25 and 37 1/2 cents, according to the distance the letter had to be carried, and double the rate when the letter was of more than one sheet of paper.
