**CITY WATER SUPPLY RUNNING SHORT**

edges of the street water their lawn and lawns on alternate days. On Sunday, however, he said, the water is turned on and left to run undisturbed all day and all night, with the result that much of it is wasted.

Commissioner Grandy suggested that arrangements might be made with the railway company to have them get their water from other sources. Engines, he said, could fill up at Kamela or at Union Junction, and for use in the shops the company could pump from Oro Dell, through the pipe line which they laid some years ago. This would re-

duce a saving of at least a third of the water that comes down through the pipes, he stated. Dr. Brown, president of the commission, brought to again the suggestion of sinking wells and pumping from them, if it were not possible to strike water. While the city wanted a permanent solution of the water question, it was imperative that immediate relief be secured, he said. It was finally decided, however, that the most practical plan for the present was that which the city manager had suggested, to put in a pump at the Palmer mill. Discussion of water rights entered into the question here, also, and the commissioners realized that should they take too much water from the river they would be apt to have a law suit on their hands.

Commissioner Grandy declared during the course of the discussion that for the past ten years the council have been going around in a circle on the water problem, and "if we can't do something to solve it," he said, "then let's quit and let somebody else here who can do it."

"Well, if you've got any solution, broach it," said Commissioner McKeen, adding "Do you know anybody that would take the job?" Mr. Grandy admitted that he had not and that he did not.

**Passage of Ordinance Asked**

Communications were on hand from the Home Independent Telephone Company and the Eastern Oregon Light and Power Company, regarding a passage which they had been forced to incur as a result of the moving of the Jay house from its old location on Adams avenue west on Adams to Second street. Taking down wires and replacing them had cost the telephone company \$321 and the Electric Light company \$32, besides greatly inconveniencing their customers. The telephone company presented a draft of an ordinance requiring that property owners bear all such expenses and asked that the city adopt it. This is the law in most other cities, it was stated. The commission referred the ordinance to the city attorney for examination.

The city attorney presented a revised draft of the new traffic ordinance which was given first and second readings last week. The revised draft was now read and the original, accepted as such and the road the third time and passed. The most important provision of this ordinance is article 10 which provides that automobiles shall not be parked on Adams avenue, between the east line of Fourth street and the west line of Oregon street, excepting for a maximum period of thirty minutes, during which time the owner of the vehicle may be transacting business in one of the business places on that street. This

must be parked at the curb at such an angle as to extend no further than the street, the distance to be twelve feet from the curb. The ordinance also provides a provision for parking on narrower streets in the city and prohibits leaving machines in alleyways. Use of Firecrackers. The prohibition of the use of firecrackers within the city limits was entirely featured by the commission, although there is a city ordinance to that effect. The members of the board were all agreed, however, that none should be allowed within the fire limits, which means the business section, and it

was decided that inasmuch as dealers have large supplies on hand there would be no objection made to the use of them outside the business area. Attention was made of the fact that the state law requires that a license must be secured from the county clerk for the selling of any firecrackers for over five cents a package and the purchaser must have a permit before the dealer can legally sell them to him. An application for a G. L. Cox, who has purchased the Imperial Hotel in this city, for a license to conduct a house, was held over pending securing of a license.
