## NEW PLANT IS COMPLETED

Magnificent New Laboratory Has Daily Capacity of 36,000 Bottles.

## ALL SIDES SEEM DISPLEASED

From the other side came intimations that in some respects the bill was not strict enough, and it was said an amendment would be offered to eliminate the section which would permit a citizen to store liquor in his home, and the other clause which would make its "use" lawful.

The President made it clear in his statement that with the failure of congress to act on his suggestion for repeal of the war time law so far as it relates to wine and beer, the effect of his proclamation to be issued upon completion of demobilization would be to permit the sale of whiskey until the country becomes "dry" to constitutional amendment January 16, 1920.

This means, according to Representative Randall, prohibitionist, California, that the country will be thrown into a whiskey drinking orgy which he says, the President surely does not desire. In order, therefore, to bridge the gap between the date of the proclamation and the effective date of constitutional prohibition, Mr. Randall announced Sunday night that he would introduce an emergency prohibition bill to prohibit removal from bond, or transportation in interstate commerce of any distilled spirits for beverage purposes.

Mr. Randall estimates that at the earliest the army would not be ready to be demobilized before October 1, at which time there would be no beer to drink and that breweries would not open for a three months' run.

Some of the outspoken opponents of prohibition, as shown by the house taking up the bill, will endeavor to have it separated and immediate consideration given the part dealing with enforcement of the war time act.

The main fight will be on the definition of intoxicating liquors, with a view to the elimination of the words "more than one-half of 1 per cent alcohol."

PROPOSED LEVY ON CAPITAL VOTED DOWN

Nation Hag Dead Weight Debt of Forty Billion Dollars As a Result of War

LONDON, (Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The House of Commons has rejected by a vote of 217 to 72 a proposal made by the Liberal party and endorsed by the Labor party for a levy on capital as a means of discharging part of England's enormous war debt.

Sir Donald McLennan, one of the Liberal leaders, in the debate preceding the vote, deprecated making the question one of party, as a capital levy, he said was "an emergency proposal to meet an emergency situation." The government, he said had to choose between a levy on capital or a continuance of the present heavy income taxation for 20 or 30 years.

Austin Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, refused to consider the idea of such a levy. He said he would not even consent to a committee of investigation into the subject, because its appointment would create fear and insecurity, and would disturb the minds of people to whom we must look for help in order to bring the finances of the country back into order.

A portion of the London press has been dealing at considerable length recently with the question of a capital levy. One of its principal proponents is C. F. G. Masterman, a prominent Liberal.

"We have concluded the war," he argues, "with a deadweight debt burden of some eight thousand millions of pounds (\$10,000,000,000). Interest and sinking fund on this debt will amount to some four hundred million pounds a year. Either that debt must be reduced by

## No Relief From High Prices Yet

RECORDS SHOW COST OF LIVING STILL RISING.

Department of Labor Statement Says Retail Price of 22 Articles Advance Two Per Cent in Month.

Ham and Round Steak each increased 3 per cent in both April and May. Sirloin Steak increased 5 per cent in April and 2 per cent in May. Rib Roast increased 4 per cent in April, and 4 per cent in May.

The above report of the Department of Labor does not apply to other markets. There is no reduction in the price of Ham, but we have reduced the price of Round Steak 9 per cent, Sirloin Steak 14 per cent, and Rib Roast 9 per cent; the rate of Veal, Mutton and Lamb have been reduced from 9 to 20 per cent.
