WORLD FAMOUS SUNKEN GARDENS ARE TO BE SOLD

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) PASADENA, Cal., July 3.—More than \$2,000,000 were expended in, and \$40,000 a year required for the upkeep of the sixty acres of ground known as the Busch sunken gardens here which were recently closed and offered for sale at the direction of Mrs. Lily Busch, widow of the millionaire St. Louis brewer, Joseph Busch. They were considered one of the most attractive of the world's famous beauty spots, and scores of expert gardeners were employed in maintaining them. Trees, shrubs and flowers from practically every part of the world were included in the collection of flora.

The sites of the gardens was purchased by Mr. Busch in 1914. Robert G. Frazer, landscape gardener, was engaged to lay them out, the first garden to be completed in the rear of Mr. Busch's home on Orange Grove avenue. The lower gardens, regarded as the more beautiful, were laid out shortly afterwards and Mr. Frazer was retained to supervise their maintenance. A special pumping plant was built to supply them with water. The two gardens were opened to the public in 1912.

At least five million people, it is claimed, have visited the terraces, arbors, glens, lagoons, valley lawns and glades of the premises. The year the Panama-Pacific international exposition in San Francisco, 1915, brought the most visitors, 1,500,000 persons passing through the gates, but each of the other six years saw hundreds of thousands of visitors in the gardens.

Mr. Busch spent most of his time in these gardens during his annual sojourns in California. He erected a cottage in the lower gardens where he frequently received his callers. While the gardens were open to the public every day in the year, they seldom were thrown open to any society. Among the few special occasions when assemblages were permitted to visit were conventions of the Shubert, Elks, American Medical Society, and the American Red Cross.

STUDENT FARM JOURNAL TO TELL STORY OF SOIL OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE—Erection of 1709 now sites

in Oregon this season has prompted the Oregon Countyman, published by the students of agriculture and home economics at the agricultural college, to tell in the July issue the story of the progress in silo construction and use of silage in this state.

Silage is not only successful in feeding hogs, but also in feeding cattle for any part of the year," says J. J. McIntosh of the department of industrial journalism, who will edit the summer vacation number. "Silage is called pasture under cover, available at all times and in any amount needed."

Long regarded as a winter and early spring feed, silage is now used to protect the summer equivalent. Such crops as corn and oats, put down with plenty of water, are fed through tiller and needed later, corn and other standard silages are fed through the winter and early spring till green, but the best milk comes from the best milk cows, and the silage have brought near-coming to thousands of ordinary cows.

Silage is also largely used as beef cattle and sheep feeds in Oregon. Some of the state's best beef and sheep men have become the biggest silo hoisters, and the story of their use of silage will be told in the Oregon Countyman by A. J. Porter, professor of animal husbandry, for the benefit of other livestockmen and farmers.

Belgian Industries Are Handicapped By Lack of Enough Able Workers

BRUSSELS. (Correspondence of the Associated Press) The number of unemployed in Belgium is \$89,000, according to the Minister for Food, but is diminishing from day to day.

Only 1,000,000 Belgian workers are working out of sixty which before the war was exacted in Belgium. Of these sixty all but four have been completely, or to a very large extent, destroyed by the Germans. The steel and iron production, which in 1913 attained 3,224,000 tons is since 1917, of 35,000 metal workers in 1917 only about two hundred are working.

It is hoped that by the end of this year, at least twenty-five blast furnaces will be producing and that 50 per cent of pre-war production will be obtained.

Six thousand operatives have resumed work in the linen industry. The English work of 54 hours has been agreed to.

In the textile industry (textiles) work may be resumed several weeks hence since a great part of the machinery which the Germans had taken away has been discovered in Leipzig and repaired.

NEARLY ALL MEXICANS COME TO STATES

MEXICO CITY, July 3.—The United States took virtually all the 1917 oil production of Mexico, about 7,500,000 tons, according to published summaries credited to the Department of Industry, Commerce and Labor. To Uncle Sam is credited exports of 6,055,733 tons, with England taking 134,184 tons and Chile leading South American importers with 650,886.

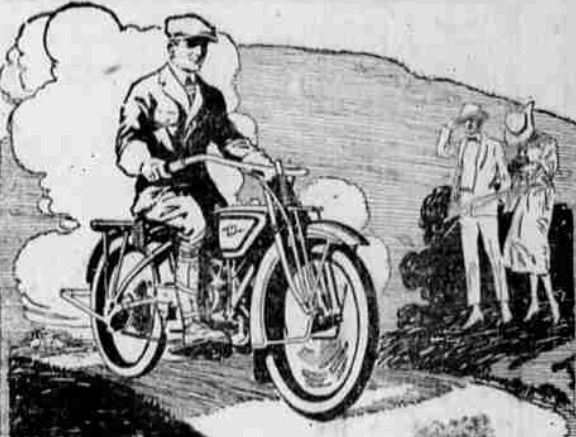
