WILL DRIVE CAR FROM DETROIT

S. D. CROWE LEAVES FOR EAST TO DRIVE HOME

Takes Oregon License and Grand Tourist's Place on New Sidebaker

Tomorrow evening S. D. Crowe, manager of the Home Independent Telephone company, will leave for the east to join Mrs. Crowe and the two boys who left two weeks ago for a visit with relatives including her brother Rev. J. M. Ramsey and family of Fairbault, Minnesota. From Chicago the family will proceed by railroad to Detroit where they will take possession of a new Sidebaker car recently purchased by J. C. Penney from the Waltons Milling and Grain company. The contract calling for delivery of the car to Mr. Crowe in Detroit. The balance of the eastern trip through Pennsylvania and New York and back to La Grande will be made in the car. Mr. Crowe armed himself with Oregon license tags and a La Grande permit which will be placed on the machine as soon as it is run out of the factory at Detroit.

At Detroit the Crowe family will be joined by William Crowe and family of Manistique, Michigan, who are also traveling by automobile. A sister of Mr. Crowe who resides at Lincoln, Nebraska, will also be a member of the party. The trip east will be taken by rail and New York state and Pennsylvania; former home of the Crowe family will be visited. They have many relatives still residing in that section. On the return from eastern points it is his intention to visit at Manistique, Michigan with William S. Crowe and family.

The trip will require several weeks and Mr. Crowe has been looking forward to this journey for a long time. He had planned to take it before the war but conditions arose which required every busy man to be at his post of duty, and the work of assisting in government undertakings all so took his time. When the federal government took over the telephone lines that put an end to his hopes of being absent for any length of time.

It has been nine years since he was back in the east. The trip is made doubly pleasant because of the plan of purchasing his machine for delivery at Detroit which enables Mrs. Crowe and the children to accompany him on the entire journey.

between them by just one inch on either side. Three times she went around the course and passed between the benches at a speed of forty miles an hour. Twice he cleared them without making either of the benches quiver, but the third time he cleared just enough to hit them as he was pulling out.

The five mile 1919-1920 race was run with four cars starting and three finishing. The Mitchell Speed-Trap developed trouble early in the race and quit, but the other went to a good finish. Ray Williams took the lead with his Maxwell and was never even approached by the other two. The Hot Lake Ford, driven by "Sentry," ran like a theougb and beat Shanks and Redmond's White for second place. The money for the event was \$100, divided fifty and twenty per cent.

After this race "Red" Williams provided entertainment with some slight balancing stunts with a motorcycle and side car and then proceeded to take his opponent, the five mile race in a fifteen mile event, through the mud. The prize to be the best one of the day. There was close competition and Williams was not able to keep the lead, all the time. The Ford again performed like a hero and the Mitchell made a touch better showing than it had done in the earlier event. Williams finished first, Tranchell second with his Mitchell, Scotty third in the Ford. Five men started but two of them hit the fence and was forced to quit with a damaged saddle. The William Service has made, in fourth, \$400, divided 80, 20 and 10 per cent, when the money got in this race.

Completing the afternoon's program Welch and Williams, indulged in another speed contest Welch driving the Mitchell, this time when Williams had previously headed. Welch took the lead at the start and Williams, who was somewhat handicapped by a broken radiator connection, was unable to catch up with him. It was a fine race, however, and both machines were good. Welch and Williams are both capable and experienced drivers and many who saw the race yesterday would give quite a little to see them traveling on a fast clip course.
